Social Security Session Set At Roseburg City Hall

C. Fenton Ford, Social Security representative from Eugene, will be in Roseburg next week working with employers, clarifying the status of employees whose Social Security numbers have been erroneously reported.

In order that wages earned by the employee may be properly credited to his account, the employer's number must match the account number maintained for the employee by the Social Security accounting office in Baltimore, Md.

Ford will be available to the public at the City Hall Council Chambers Tuesday, June 7, from 8:30 a.m. to noon. He will answer any questions or handle any claims pertaining to Social Security.

Ford said the proposed amendments to the Social Security Act have not yet become law, and that there have been no changes made by Congress which have yet become effective. The law which went into effect Jan. 1, 1951.

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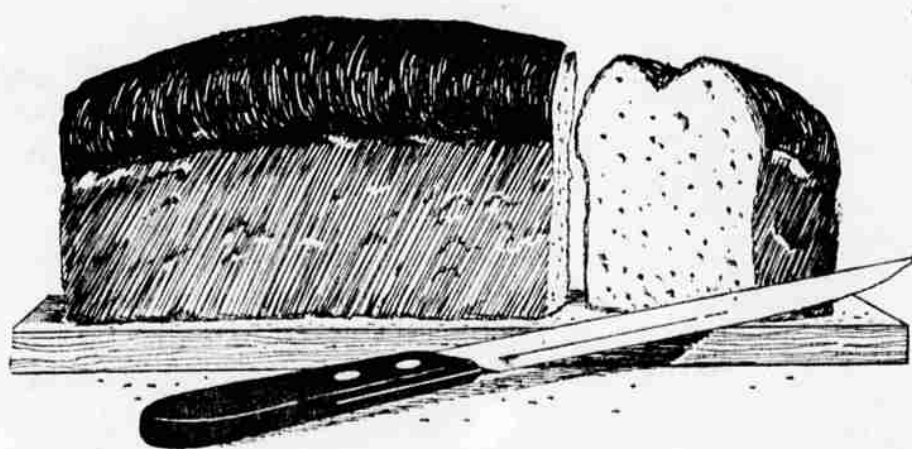
