Adjudication of 26 piano students of Mrs. C. S. Heinline will begin May 31 by Malcolm Frost of Portland, who is arriving here this weekend to preside at the hearings sponsored by the National Guild of Piano Teachers. There are 175 judges, selected for their sympathetic approach as well as for their achievements, hear approximately 35,000 young people in 400 centers.

Rhythm, accuracy, tone-quality, phrasing and pedaling are among the thirty-two points considered in rating piano playing. Each student plays from memory three to ten numbers and all above elementary stage are required to pass a test on scales and cadences. The auditions are conducted privately to put the student at ease and not necessitate renting a large hall.

Self-realization is possible for the musically minded through annual auditions. The pupil has an incentive and tries to attain a goal set for him individually by his teacher, but does not compete with any other pupil. When he grows up, he will understand better how to select a musician for his church, school or club.

The room furnishings were given by the DAR members in their respective states, and represent some of the finest authentic pieces of furniture and treasures of this country.

From the Maryland room with its gilt chair formerly at Mt. Vernon, the New Jersey room furnished after the Jacobean beamed, the wood paneling being made from the oak of the British frigate, "Augusta," which sank during the Battle of Red Bank, Oct. 22, 1777, and the unique stained glass windows depicting scenes from the Revolution—American War; the Texas music room filled with fine antique musical instruments including an Empire square piano, a Sheraton organ, a Browne harp, the earliest American-made harp, a lap melodeon dated 1728; to the colonial kitchen placed holding cranes and brickbats taken from an old farm house on Providence Road, which was traversed by troops of George Washington on their way to Valley Forge from the flintlock gun to the fine collection of old pewter, this room portrays the outside colonial kitchen of the South as well as the indoor kitchen of the North, and the fine Louisiana patio adding an artistic touch to the realistic replica of enchanting old New Orleans gave the listeners a vivid picture of these treasures of the past.
