Farm Problem Election Issue In Primaries

A farm issue test in South Dakota, with Democrats striving to run up a big protest vote against Republican agricultural policies, provided the chief national interest of primary elections in three states Tuesday.

The other states involved in the voting were Nevada, featuring a five-man race for the Democratic nomination for governor, and Alabama where former Gov. James Folsom's victory in the first primary took most of the luster out of a Democratic runoff.

The only statewide Democratic contest in South Dakota was between E. F. Metcalf, Alcoa, a banker, and Ed C. Martin, Chandler rancher, for the gubernatorial nomination.

Both of them have accused the GOP, in a wheat state where farm price supports are a hot issue, of backing "unsatisfactory farm legislation." Democratic leaders have backed the 90 percent of party price supports on major crops which the Eisenhower administration wants to replace with flexible price plans.

persons by a minimum of \$5. The new monthly minimum would rise from \$25 to \$30.

Maximum monthly benefits for a retired worker would be hiked from \$85 to \$98.50. Those increases, affecting persons already receiving benefits, would become operative 1 1/2 months after the bill becomes law.

Most of the other changes would become effective next Jan. 1. For covered workers not yet retired, the maximum monthly benefit would go up to \$108.50. It now is \$85. The top for a retired worker and his wife, if she is over 65, would jump from \$127.50 to \$127.75. The maximum payable to any one family would be raised from the present \$108.75 monthly to \$200.

Persons already retired but having small earnings from part-time work would get a break. Existing law cuts them off from benefits for any month in which they earn more than \$75 in covered employment. The new proposed law would let them earn at least \$1,000 a year from covered or uncovered employment. Above that, they would lose one month's benefits for each month in which they earned more than \$50.
