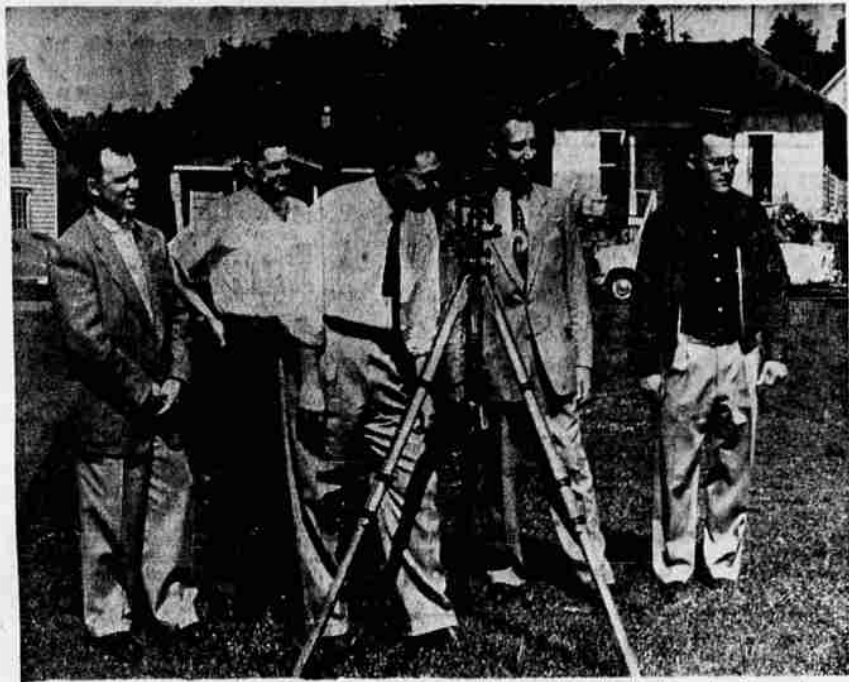

Contractor Starts Work On Glide School Building

Industrial Building Co. of Eugene has begun work on the first unit of the school building program approved by Glide voters on April 3.

J. A. Beck, owner of the company, and Ray Meyers of Roseburg, superintendent of construction, staked out the location of the unit Tuesday. The unit adjoins the Glide High School grounds on the north. Excavation began Wednesday. Beck said work on forms for the concrete foundation will start June 7. All labor will be done by local employees, Beck stated.

The building will be 33 x 80 feet; four classrooms will be 27 x 33 feet each. Also included will be an office for District Supt. Byron Evans; storage room, janitor's supply room, and numerous closets.

Eighth grade students will occupy two of the classrooms, and the high school drawing and music classes will occupy the other two.

Cost of construction of the building has been set at \$66,712. Beck's firm was the builder of the new Glide High School, which was completed in 1952.

No Clues Found Of Missing Plane

A ground party searching for a private plane missing eight days returned from an area near Elkton Tuesday night without finding any clues.

Sheriff Cal Baird said local searchers who joined a party from the coast in a search Tuesday have returned to Roseburg.

An intensive search has been made of the northern Douglas County area for James Frank, a student pilot from Empire, who disappeared May 24 on a flight from North Bend to Ukiah.

Tuesday's ground search, one of several during the last few days, was touched off when an air observer spotted what he thought might have been the wreckage of a plane.

A logger in the Elkton area also had heard a plane flying over the area the day the airman disappeared, according to George Douglas of the search and rescue unit of the State Board of Aeronautics. Douglas said the search would continue in the Elkton area. Aircraft from Coos Bay and Springfield are continuing the air search.

Bus To Transport Children To Pool

The Green Dad's Club is backing a Green area recreational project, in which a bus schedule will be set up to transport students to the Roseburg city pool for a swimming class, July 12 to 26.

Umpqua Plywood Corp. is making the bus available to the youngsters as their contribution to the summer program.

The usual Red Cross regulations apply for the swimming. A child must have attended school for one year; each must furnish his own towel and suit; and registration must be made in advance at the Green School this week only, during school hours.

After registrations have been made, the bus route will be determined and a schedule published. Children in the Green area should sign up by Friday since a limited number only can be carried on the bus.

Counselor John G. Adams "were doing their best" to stop the McCarthy subcommittee's investigation of Communists in the Army.

"Certainly you do not believe Secretary Stevens and Mr. Adams were unwilling to expose Communists," Sen. Dworshak (R-Idaho) demanded.

"Of course not," Cohn said. Then he added that he believed both officials "had a mistaken notion that the exposure... would be a reflection on them."

"I don't think it was a question of them wanting Communists in the Army. Of course it wasn't."

Dworshak asked whether Cohn believes the Army now would go on and press its own investigations if the McCarthy inquiries ceased.

"No," Cohn said. "I don't believe that. I believe that the moment this committee stops there will be a relaxation."

Cohn, chief counsel to the McCarthy subcommittee, was in the witness chair for the fourth day at the McCarthy-Army hearings.

Weekend Arrests Are Disposed Of In District Court

The results of a big Memorial Day weekend were channeled through district court Tuesday in the form of four drunken drivers and three men charged with being drunk in public places.

Glen Knapp, 54, a Riddle saw-mill worker, pleaded guilty to drunk driving and was fined \$200. District Judge Imer G. Baldwin. He was arrested by state police Saturday.

Patent Sues Doctor For \$140,000 Damages

Jean Redifer has filed a suit in Douglas County Circuit Court for \$140,000 general damages against Dr. Fredrick A. Bracker, osteopath, for injuries she alleges she received in childbirth.

The complaint says that on Dec. 14, 1953, Bracker administered a "spinal anesthetic injection" to lessen the pain during delivery. The injection was made in the lumbar region of the back, the complaint relates.

Mrs. Redifer charges that the injection was made "negligently, causing injury to nerve in the lower region of the spinal cord."

Mrs. Redifer states in the complaint she has lost the use of both legs, suffers dizzy spells and on occasion becomes unconscious and occasionally loses the use of both arms.

She asks for no special damages.

Huge Ammunition Dump At Saigon Blows Up

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—Huge stores of explosives blew up today in a French munitions dump near Saigon's main residential section. One person was killed and several injured.

Authorities feared the explosions might go on for two days. It was not immediately determined whether the explosions resulted from an accident or sabotage by the Communist-led Viet-minh, many of whom are known to be in Saigon. The French command put the Saigon garrison on an immediate alert and troops were ordered to return to their billets at once.

Hint Given AFL, CIO Are Combining Efforts

PORTLAND (AP)—Another round of CIO International Woodworker contract talks with employers opened here Wednesday amid newspaper speculation that the CIO and the AFL might get together in united action in an effort to win a pay boost.

The basis of the speculation appeared to be two reports. One from the Coos Bay area said CIO Woodworkers and AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers had, at the local level, worked together in some of their contract talks with employers. The other was that such joint action had been suggested by the CIO union's Western Washington District 23 and its plywood District 9.

Rural Firemen Called Out For Grass Blaze

Roseburg Rural firemen were called out at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday when grass in a vacant lot caught fire. No damage was done at the lot on Ellen Lane, just south of the fire station on Garden Valley Road.

Firemen said the blaze, which was nearly out when they were called, started from an unauthorized trash fire. Residents of the Rural Fire Protection Dist. were reminded that permits are required on all burnings. The number to call for permits is 3-5503, not the alarm number.

Submarine Blast Kills Two Civilian Workmen

PORTSMOUTH, N. H. (AP)—A flash explosion early Wednesday killed two civilian workmen aboard the Navy submarine Sirago as she lay in drydock at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard.

A sailor on fire watch duty nearby was burned by the blast, but his condition was described as "not critical."

Six other civilians working on the submarine were not injured.

Million Dollar Fire Hits New Jersey City

EDGEWATER, N. J. (AP)—A million dollar fire raged through a two-block area of this industrial community's waterfront Tuesday, wrecking three warehouses, three old docks and almost 100 new cars.

Some 125 firemen were injured or overcome by the heavy smoke in fighting the spectacular blaze. About 30 of the firemen were taken to hospitals for treatment.

Halibut Boat Sinks Off British Columbia

PRINCE RUPERT, B.C. (AP)—The halibut boat Prosperity from New Westminster, B.C., sank in 36 feet of water with 16,000 pounds of halibut off the West Coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands Tuesday.

The six men aboard escaped in a dory after the Prosperity struck rocks and started to go down. The seamen were picked up by the halibut boat Bate Pass of Vancouver and then flown to Prince Rupert from Langara Island.

Capt. Andy Christensen, skipper of the Prosperity, said he doubted if the vessel could be salvaged.

have written to their congressmen urging such action despite the American Medical Assn's stand against social security coverage for doctors.

In general, the House-passed legislation would:

1. Blanket about 9,700,000 more persons into the social security system. Some of these would have a choice of coming in or staying out.

2. Increase the annual wage base on which workers and their employers pay social security taxes and on which benefits are calculated.

3. Boost monthly benefit payments for persons already retired and those retiring in the future.

4. Permit retired persons under 75 to earn more money through part-time or full-time employment without losing benefits.

Largest new group that would be brought into the social security system include 3,600,000 owners or operators of farms and 1,300,000 farm hands.

accomplishments of the administration during its first 16 months in office.

In a prepared statement, Eisenhower said "the constant surveillance of Communists in this country is a 24-hour seven-days-a-week 32-weeks-a-year job. It is carried out by the appropriate federal agencies in conformance with due process of law. It is being done quietly and relentlessly and those who best know its effectiveness are the Communists themselves."

At the outset of the conference, the President said that one word—communism—seemed to get more attention these days than any other.

Then he went on to mention the Justice Department report and his statement on it, but he did not read the statement. He said it amounted to an impressive list of accomplishments.

Then Eisenhower alluded to a statement which Atty. Gen. Brownell last Friday and the President said it was put out at his (Eisenhower's) direction.

That amounted to a reaffirmation of the administration position with respect to McCarthy.

In the Friday statement, Brownell said the executive branch of the government "has the sole and fundamental responsibility under the constitution for the enforcement of our laws and presidential orders."

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Tornado Strike Kills 1; Injures 11 In West Texas

More stormy and wet weather was the outlook for wide areas from the Rockies to the East Coast Wednesday.

Tornadoes struck in sections of Western Texas and Western Pennsylvania Tuesday night, killing one and injuring 11.

Strong gusty winds blew over sections of the Plains Saturday Wednesday, with gusts of 53 miles per hour reported at Pierre, S. D.

The storm which swept the midwest Tuesday, was located in the Eastern Great Lakes region Wednesday morning. Cooler air pushing eastward north of the storm center brought showers and thunderstorms throughout Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York State.

Up to six inches of snow fell at points along the Continental Divide from Montana to Colorado.

Tuesday as a Pacific cold front moved across Montana. Snow fell in Great Falls, Butte, Lewistown and Belgrade. But in Colorado readings in the 80s and 90 at La Junta were reported.

One of the twisters in West Texas killed an infant and injured nine persons at Paducah. A smaller tornado struck near Bakersfield, 110 miles west of San Angelo.
