

## Senate Approves Additional REA Funds Measure

WASHINGTON — A farm money bill carrying more than \$1,083,000,000—about 100 millions more than President Eisenhower asked—was passed by the Senate late Wednesday.

Approval came on a voice vote after the Senate added more than \$8 million dollars to the amount allowed by its Appropriations Committee.

Among the differences is an extra 35 million dollars voted by the Senate Wednesday for rural electrification work.

By a narrow 42-40 margin, with many last minute changes and additions, the extra 35 million dollars of loan authority was added to a 100 million dollar fund previously approved by the House and the Senate Appropriations Committee.

President Eisenhower had asked only 55 millions of new funds for REA and Republican Leader Knowland (Calif.) and other GOP senators staged a futile floor battle to hold the total to the 45 millions above this previously voted by the House and the Senate committee.

## Vice Adm. Richmond Takes Coast Guard Post

WASHINGTON — Vice Adm. Alfred Carroll Richmond Tuesday assumed the top post in the Coast Guard after 32 years in the service. Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey administered the oath as commander of the Coast Guard to Richmond in a ceremony at the Treasury. In peacetime, the Coast Guard operates as an agency of the Treasury.

At the same ceremony, Humphrey swore in Rear Adm. James A. Hirschfield as assistant commander. Richmond, a native of Waterloo, Iowa, succeeds Vice Adm. Merlin O'Neill, who is retiring after approximately 4½ years as commander.

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Announcement of the vote was delayed for a long period as additional senators rushed to the floor.

## FESTIVAL ATTRACTIONS

BROOKINGS, Ore. — The final day of the 15th annual Astoria Festival at this Southern Oregon coast town attracted an estimated 10,000 persons.

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## Douglas County Payroll Drops Slightly In 1953

SALEM — Sixteen of Oregon's 36 counties had bigger payrolls last year than in 1952, the Oregon Unemployment Compensation Commission said Wednesday.

The 1953 payroll for the state, announced last week, was a record \$1,298,380,028, or 2.2 per cent above the 1952 figure.

The biggest dollar gains were in Multnomah, Lane, Wasco and Clackamas counties.

Multnomah County's payroll jumped more than 32 millions to \$586,084,478, or 45.1 per cent of the state's total.

The Lane County increase was 5½ millions to a new mark of \$112,780,328. Clackamas increased 2½ millions to \$35,640,004.

Wasco County, with The Dalles Dam construction, had a \$10,683,652 total, a 16 per cent gain.

The largest percentage gain was in Gilliam County, which had a 34.9 per cent increase and a payroll of \$848,018.

Douglas County, in third place after Multnomah and Lane, had a drop for the first time since 1938, when it was in 17th place. Coast and Marion counties, ranking

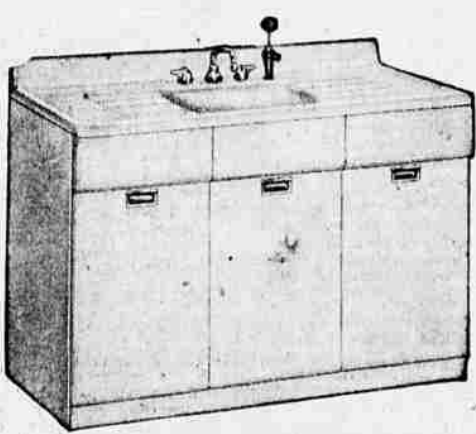

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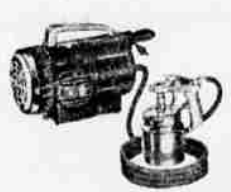

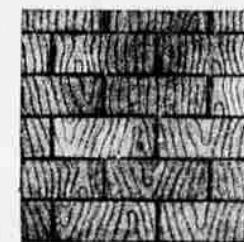
