

Expired Visa Dampens Trip

VICTORIA, B. C. (AP) — An expired visa on the passport of a German exchange student almost wrecked the holiday of 40 Oregon high school students Tuesday.

Weeping Elizabeth von Treuenfels, 19-year-old exchange student from Germany, went back to Port Angeles, Wash., at least temporarily stopping the trip for which she and 39 others had worked and saved for more than a year.

When the group landed on the ferry Tuesday it was found that Elizabeth's visa had expired the day before and if she landed here she would be unable to re-enter the United States.

Her classmates—some of them weeping also—wanted to return to Port Angeles with her, but she insisted on going alone.

Meanwhile frantic wires have been sent to Washington, D. C., asking for a renewal of the visa. The class is waiting for her here, instead of going on their vacation.

Jerry Metcalfe, principal of Sinclair High School in Florence, Ore., said he hoped the girl could rejoin the party Wednesday.

Welfare Dept. Has Fired 238 Security Risks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Department of Health, Education and Welfare says that by April 30 it had fired or otherwise eliminated 238 security risks, including 114 suspected subversives.

The total, reported to Congress in testimony superseding the Civil Service Commission's report last March that the department had uncovered 78 security risks.

The department also told a House Appropriations subcommittee that, in one 78-case category, about 40 percent of those eliminated as security risks had been hired under the Eisenhower administration. The remainder, it said, were holdovers from Democratic administrations.

No breakdown was provided, in this case, between suspected subversives and those removed for other causes. A security risk may be a person who drinks or gossips too much or is found to be unstable mentally.

A number of Democrats in Congress have protested that many such persons left government service voluntarily without knowing they were classified as security risks.

Secretary Hobby testified that the government's newest department, with about 1,000 "sensitive" jobs, has set up a special 35-employee office of internal security to screen the staff. She requested \$285,000 for this office, as part of a proposed \$1,800,342,000 budget for the department during the year beginning July 1.

Giving Car For Price Of Beans Held Illegal

OLYMPIA (AP) — It isn't legal, says Atty. Gen. Don Eastvold, to buy a pot of beans and win a new car all for the price of the beans.

Such goings on, the state's highest legal adviser said, are the province of the various counties Tuesday, are lotteries and therefore unlawful.

He wrote the opinion at the request of State Sen. Paul Luvera of Anacortes who acts as a grocer when not lawmaking.

The promotion plans constitute unfair competition, he advised the attorneys in commenting on a plan whereby customers are offered tickets for drawings on the prizes.

The drawings, he said, are "a menace to the free enterprise system and every effort should be taken . . . to curb this kind of activity."

He said, however, the "curb" should be applied at the local level.

Cpl. Batchelor Signs Non-Communist Affidavit

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — One of the U.S. soldiers who first refused repatriation while a prisoner of the Communists in Korea has signed a non-Communist affidavit.

Cpl. Claude Batchelor, 22, of Kermit, Tex., signed the affidavit at Fort Sam Houston's post prison. It clears the way for him in collecting about \$4,000 in back pay.

Batchelor's civilian counsel, Joel Westbrook, said part of the money would be used in the corporal's defense. The rest, the lawyer said, will be used to bring Kyoto. Batchelor's Japanese wife, to this country from Tokyo where she is living with her family.

Batchelor is imprisoned while the Army is deciding whether to court-martial him on charges of collaborating with the enemy while a prisoner of war.

54-Year-Old Man Gets Degree From College

SALEM (AP) — Scott William Anderson, 54-year-old religious major with nine children and 13 grandchildren, was graduated magna laude from Willamette University Sunday.

He entered Willamette two years ago after attending Los Angeles Valley Junior College in California. He worked night and day to get his education at Willamette, having a pastorate at the Methodist Church in Turner, and being a night cattle supervisor at the training school for boys and the home for feeble-minded persons.

After graduation, the Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Anderson rushed to Annapolis, Md., to see one of their sons graduate from the U. S. Naval Academy.

BILL OF RIGHTS EXTENDED

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Veterans Committee Wednesday approved a two-year extension of the Korean GI "bill of rights."

The committee gave its okay to a bill giving men who entered the armed forces after the start of hostilities in Korea up to four years after their discharge to apply for government educational and other benefits provided in the bill.
