Anita has been active in school affairs. She is secretary of her senior class. She was a senior class carnival princess and took part in the senior class play. Anita plans to attend the University of Oregon in the fall.

Last year the local scholarship was given to Carolyn Rae Burr; in 1952 to Janet and Joyce Harpham; and in 1951 to Marlene Lewis.

Education is one of the important projects of PEO members. This sisterhood maintains and supports Cotter Junior College for girls. It is located in Nevada, Mo. The college was founded in 1884 and in 1927 was given to the PEO Sisterhood, which is the only women's organization in the U.S. to own and operate a college. At

present there are 12 Oregon girls enrolled at Cotter. The Oregon state chapter makes available two \$450 scholarships to Cotter College each year, also five \$125 awards to be used for study in Oregon schools.

As a further aid to education, the PEO Sisterhood started a national educational loan fund in 1907. It is now the largest of its kind in existence. At this time 21 girls from Oregon, holding loans amounting to nearly \$12,000, are studying in colleges of their own choice at home or in foreign countries.

A PEO scholarship cup is presented annually to the girl receiving the highest grades in junior high school. This award has been made each year since 1939.

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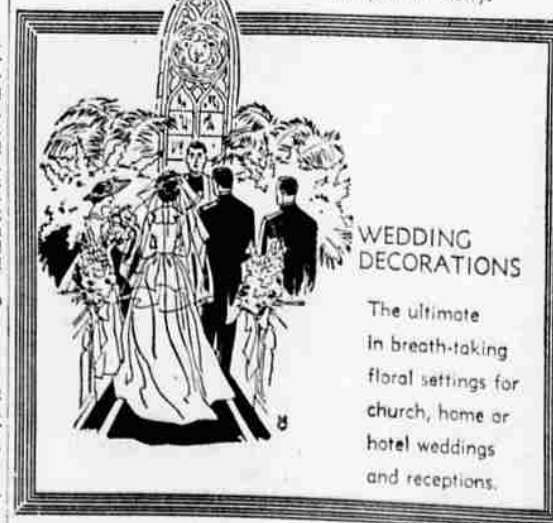
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
