Snow, High Water Still Block Interest Points

BEND — A number of points of interest in the Deschutes National Forest, still are blocked to travelers by snow and high water, the Forest Service office here reported Thursday.

The points not reachable include Broken Top Crater, Elk Lake via Cascade Locks Railway, Irish and Taylor lakes, Sparks Lake, Summit Lake, Three Creeks Lake via Sisters, Todd Lake and Windigo Pass.

Waldo Lake is closed, and the Big Lake route is blocked by snow at Cache Mountain junction.

New Dock Union Drops Bargain Vote Protest

NEW YORK — The new AFL dock union reportedly has dropped plans to protest the recent water front bargaining representation 2,000 Jersey City and Hoboken, election and is reducing its local headquarters to a skeleton staff.

Published reports to that effect last night followed an announcement by the rival International Longshoremen's Assn. that nearly 2,000 Jersey City and Hoboken, N. J., dockers who joined the new union want to return to the old ILA.

The bargaining representation election of May 26 gave the old ILA an edge of 319 votes, but 1,797 ballots were challenged. The final result is in the hands of the National Labor Relations Board, which was scheduled to start considering the challenged votes today.
