Sutherlin Man Dies Saturday While On Trip

A 38-year-old Sutherlin man, Harold William Barber, died suddenly Saturday afternoon while on a fishing trip with his son, Harley. The trip was to Culver Mt., about 20 miles southwest of Roseburg. Coroner L. L. Powers said death was from a heart attack.

He was born at Aberdeen, S.D. March 27, 1916, and spent his early youth in that area. He was married to Gladys Fae Titus of Sioux Falls, S.D., on July 4, 1936. The family moved to Yakima, Wash., in 1938, then to Snohomish, Wash., before moving to Sutherlin in 1949. He was the local representative of the Woodman's Accident and Life Insurance Co.

Mercury is used in making electrical apparatus, thermometers and control instruments, poisons like fungicides and insecticides, paint, pharmaceuticals, in chemical processes, and to a very limited extent in the production of munitions and blasting caps.

scientists Sunday told Eisenhower that more security reviews like that given Dr. Oppenheimer would point to a "sure road to national suicide" by eliminating "men of independent mind from our defense establishments."

In an open letter to Eisenhower, 10 officers and members of the Federation of American Scientists suggested appointment of a special presidential advisory board of leaders in government, science and law to form a balanced security policy.

Among findings of the special AEC panel Tuesday were that Oppenheimer had contributed to delaying the start of hydrogen bomb development and that he had associated with Communists for years.

The scientists wrote Eisenhower: "The purge of a loyal scientist for giving frank advice presents grave peril to our nation. Such a policy, if continued, will eliminate the men of independent mind from our defense establishments. In this age when new weapons repeatedly dwarf the destructive power of their predecessors, this is a sure road to national suicide."

James Roosevelt Says He'll Win Primary Nod

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—James Roosevelt, who says he will win despite the opposition of the chairman of the Democratic National Committee, heads into the political battle of his life Tuesday in California's primary election.

The late President's eldest son is backed by the 26th District Democratic Council for a seat in Congress and observers give him an excellent chance of winning the Democratic nomination. As he has crossed-fied, he could win the Republican nomination, too.

The question is whether voters will be influenced by his sensational marital dispute, in which is wife, Romelle, accused him of intimacies with a nozen women. Trial of their divorce suit will not be until after the final election in November.

Roosevelt denies his wife's charges.

Ex-Fellow Prisoners Honor Heroic Chaplain

NILSEN, Kan. (AP)—The Rev. Emil J. Kapaun, heroic Catholic chaplain who died in a wretched North Korean prison camp, was honored in his hometown church Sunday by his fellow prisoners of war.

A crucifix exquisitely carved by prisoners from a piece of oak cut from a tree with a makeshift knife in the prison camp was presented to the St. John Church in this tiny village where Father Kapaun preached his first sermon.

Capt. Ralph Nardella, Paterson, N. J., presented a check for \$8,300 from fellow prisoners of the chaplain.

Nardella told how the camp's inmates vowed to contribute a fund in Father Kapaun's honor after he died of dysentery and pneumonia May 6, 1951, at the age of 35.

Rebels Closing Pincers On French Defense Line

HANOI, Indochina (AP)—Vietminh troops which crushed Dien Bien Phu have wheeled back into position all around the defense lines guarding the vital Red River delta. The French high command announced today. The rebel forces form a gigantic pincers threatening an all-out assault to drive the French from their north Indochina bastion.

Barring the slim chance the Geneva conference might stop the war by ordering a cease-fire, indications increased that the Communist-led rebels will hit the delta with everything they have before the end of June.

The French meanwhile continued to build up their forces in the strategic area, pouring in reinforcement from other parts of Indochina and from Europe.

In an all-out assault, the French expect the rebels to try first to isolate Hanoi by severing the road and rail lines linking the city with the port of Haiphong, 64 miles to the east.

These routes are the lifeline for continued resistance to the Communist-led tide, for they carry the bulk of U. S.-supplied war material from Haiphong to Hanoi and the fighting fronts.

Rebels Closing Pincers On French Defense Line

HANOI, Indochina (AP)—Vietminh troops which crushed Dien Bien Phu have wheeled back into position all around the defense lines guarding the vital Red River delta. The French high command announced today. The rebel forces form a gigantic pincers threatening an all-out assault to drive the French from their north Indochina bastion.

Barring the slim chance the Geneva conference might stop the war by ordering a cease-fire, indications increased that the Communist-led rebels will hit the delta with everything they have before the end of June.

The French meanwhile continued to build up their forces in the strategic area, pouring in reinforcement from other parts of Indochina and from Europe.

In an all-out assault, the French expect the rebels to try first to isolate Hanoi by severing the road and rail lines linking the city with the port of Haiphong, 64 miles to the east.

These routes are the lifeline for continued resistance to the Communist-led tide, for they carry the bulk of U. S.-supplied war material from Haiphong to Hanoi and the fighting fronts.

Statehood For Hawaii, Not Alaska, Now Looms

WASHINGTON (AP)—GOP congressional leaders expressed renewed hope after a White House conference Monday that Congress will grant statehood to Hawaii this year. Alaska would not be included in the plan.

The House has passed a bill to give Hawaii statehood. The Senate added statehood for Alaska also, however, and neither House has agreed to the other's action. President Eisenhower, who favors statehood for Hawaii, has said he does not consider Alaska ready yet for similar action.
