Brawl Sparks Action In Game At Oakland

A five-minute brawl in the ninth inning spiced Myrtle Creek's 9-8, 12-inning win over Oakland in the two team's league game at Oakland. Tempers cooled quickly when Myrtle Creek pitcher Charlie Brown was knocked out during the battle.

The two principals in the pop-off, Manager Elmer Plueard of Oakland and catcher Phillips of Myrtle Creek were both booed from the field by the plate umpire when play was resumed.

Oakland had scored two runs in the bottom of the ninth and trailed 8-7 when fists began flailing the air, Blacklock, batting for Oakland, claimed that he was hit by a pitched ball thrown by pitcher Brown while he attempted to hunt.

The umpire overruled, however, ruling that Blacklock had actually missed the pitch for a strike and that he had not been hit by the ball.

Mark Robbins Wins State AAU Mile Championship

Roseburg's Mark Robbins remained undefeated in 1954 high school competition by adding the Oregon AAU mile title to his collection of wins in Portland Saturday, in the time of 4:28.1.

The Roseburg High School Junior also made an impressive showing in the championship class two-mile when he placed third behind two University of Washington runners.

Winner of this event was Pacific Coast Conference champion Denny Myer in the time of 9:18.0. Finishing about 200 yards behind, Robbins toured the eight laps in 9:55.6.

In winning the mile by about 30 yards over his closest adversary, Stan Rutherford of Estacada, the local ace took the top medal in the event for the second straight year. His time was his second fastest of the year.

Six other locals accompanied Roseburg Coach Frank Purdy to the meet, but none finished in the money.

Frank Purdy Jr. came closest to a medal finish with a sixth place in the junior class low hurdles. He also took part in the junior class high hurdles and high jump.

Sam Long with a 44-11 put and Jack Lander with a 43-7 toss failed to place in the shot. Rudy Morgan took part in the discus, Dave Monger gave it a try in the mile and 880 and Ed Stritzke ran behind in the championship class two-mile. All others named immediately above participated in the high school class events.

Minoso Leads Chicago In Two Victories

Orestes (Minnie) Minoso, cited by Ted Williams as "potentially the greatest player in the American League," has thrust himself boldly into the running for most coveted honor the junior circuit has to offer — the most Valuable Player award.

Largely because of the all-around brilliance of this fleet-footed son of Matanza, Cuba, the Chicago White Sox have been able to keep within striking distance of the league-leading Cleveland Indians.

No player — and that includes Williams, Al Rosen and Yogi Berra — has done more for his club than Minoso. As the season comes to the one-third mark, the 30-year-old outfielder leads the circuit in runs batted in, runs scored, triples and stolen bases. He is second in hits, third in home runs and doubles and fourth in batting. His team value is reflected in his ability to do a workmanlike job at third base as well as anywhere in the outfield.

Minoso was Chicago's big gun again yesterday as the White Sox swept a double-header from Washington 5-3 and 6-0 to run their winning streak to five straight and stay within 8 percentage points of first place. He smashed his 10th home run with a man on base to provide the winning margin in the opener. He collected three singles, drove in his 50th and 51st runs, scored his 46th run and stole his seventh base in the nightcap. He is hitting .333.

Cleveland protected its first-place margin by sweeping a double-header from the Athletics in Philadelphia 2-1 and 7-5 while Brooklyn boosted its National League lead to two games, thrashing the Chicago Cubs 6-4 for its ninth straight.

The Baltimore Orioles held New York to a split in their twin bill to drop the third-place Yankees 3 1/2 games behind the pace. Veterans

an Joe Coleman, continuing his fine comeback, beat the Yankees 7-4 for his sixth victory but the Yankees won the second game 5-2 as Allie Reynolds outpitched Don Larsen.

Boston's Red Sox went on a home run binge to defeat Detroit 7-4. Homers by Ted Lepcio, Milt Bolling, Harry Agganis and Jackie Jensen accounted for all Boston's runs.

Philadelphia's Phillies outslugged the St. Louis Cardinals 11-3 to tie Milwaukee for third place in the National and advance to within a game of the runner-up New York Giants. The Phils got all their runs in the first and seventh innings. Bobby Morgan's grand-slam homer highlighted the six-run first.

The Giants and Cincinnati Reds exchanged 3-2 decisions. The Giants won the first game on Monte Irvin's 10th homer of the season in the eighth. The Reds took the nightcap in the ninth when Bob Borkowski singled to score Chuck Harmon from second.

Pittsburgh survived a grand slam homer by Milwaukee's Eddie Mathews and won the second game 6-4 after Jim Wilson had pitched the Braves to a 4-0 opening-game victory. The veteran right-hander permitted only four hits in his first start of the season.

A trio of triples paved the way for Cleveland's pair of victories over Philadelphia. Two of them came in the second inning of the first game and helped Bob Feller record the 25th victory of his career. They were hit by Dave Philley and George Strickland. Each scored on a sacrifice fly. The third triple was hit by rookie catcher Hal Naragon with the bases full in the fourth inning to provide the

margin of victory in the second game.

Minoso surrendered first-game batting honors to teammate Jim Rivera. The White Sox outfielder slammed a pair of homers, doubled and scored three runs to extend his hitting streak through 14 games. Rookie southpaw Jack Harshman turned in a seven-hit shutout in the nightcap.

Bob Kennedy's two-run double highlighted a four-run seventh that gave the Orioles an uphill victory over the Yankees. Reynolds allowed only five hits and fanned eight to record his sixth triumph against one defeat in the second game. Mickey Mantle's 10th homer with a man on clinched the Yankee victory.

Four straight singles by Peeewe Reese, Duke Snider, Jackie Robinson and Gil Hodges after two were hit in the 10th snapped a 4-4 tie and enabled the Dodgers to sweep their four-game series in Chicago. Robinson, with four hits including a home run, took over the National League batting lead with .388.
