Up Home Building Goal, U.S. Urged

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Congressman and a college professor said Monday America's home building goals must be mutually raised, perhaps doubled—if the nation is to be assured of adequate housing.

These conclusions were voiced by Rep. Yates (D-Ill.) and Dr. William L. C. Wheaton, University of Pennsylvania professor, in talks prepared for the National Housing Conference, Inc., a group interested in public and low cost housing.

The conference, opening a two-day meeting here, received a letter of greetings from President Eisenhower, who wrote:

"It is my hope that your activities during this series of meetings will produce notable contributions toward the common goal: The assurance that all American families can live in the kind of home and community environment that conforms to this country's high standards."

Schine Challenges Stevens' Charges

WASHINGTON (AP)—Pvt. G. David Schine Monday challenged the sworn testimony of Secretary of the Army Stevens that Schine initiated a telephone talk that had Oct. 21 about Schine's prospective Army future.

Schine was briefly a witness on a hot point of argument as the McCarthy-Army hearings got on the record some previously "leaked" transcripts of monitored McCarthy-Stevens telephone talks and five, not previously disclosed, conversations between Stevens and Roy M. Cohn, chief counsel to the McCarthy subcommittee.

In one of the latter talks, on Sept. 20, Stevens pleaded with Cohn not to make "too much of a spectacle" out of questioning of Maj. Gen. Richard B. Patridge, former chief of Army intelligence, and also said it would do no good to make Army intelligence "look awfully silly."
