Legion Team Practice Set During Week

Practice for the Roseburg American Legion Junior baseball team, defending district champion, opens this week at Finlay Field under the direction of Bill Harper, Roseburg coach.

Practices will be held every night this week beginning at 5 p.m., unless rain prevails. The season's opening game for the locals is Saturday against Myrtle Creek at Myrtle Creek.

A nine-game league schedule will end in mid-July when the league champion will enter league playoffs. Last year the Roseburg entry lost out to North Bend in three games in an inter-district playoff.

The four-team district will include teams from Roseburg, Myrtle Creek, Sutherlin - Oakland and Drain.

Among veteran players expected to be back in uniform this year are pitchers Jerry Droscher and Gary Crenshaw, and infielders/outfielders Denny Brundage, Fred Hargis and Loren Sargent.

Harper will carry about a 15-man squad with boys who attained their 17th birthday after Jan. 1, 1954, making them eligible to play.

The locals also hope to schedule games against Covallis, Gans Pass and Albany teams in addition to their regular league games.

Games played by the Sutherlin-Oakland entry during the day will be played on the Oakland field and those scheduled for night will be played on the Sutherlin Field.

Sideliner

Given a chance to survive, Evergreen League baseball will be major league baseball for most towns in the county this year. Only Drain of the county teams escaped unscathed from last year's faster Southwestern Oregon League campaign and is fielding another entry this year.

But county fans in Roseburg, Yoncalla, Oakland, Myrtle Creek, Glendale, Sutherlin and Winston need feel no hesitancy in supporting their favorites if they're out to see plenty of action. Even in its youth, the season has produced its share of the unusual and usual excitement.

Sunday's Oakland-Myrtle Creek brawl was no fluke, and although it isn't recommended baseball procedure for every game, it does indicate that everybody is playing for keeps, and that's important to the fans.

Roseburg's entry, under the direction of Charles Forrest, appears to have found itself, after a most shaky start when even those closest to the situation held little hope for fielding a team earlier in the season. But the determined Forrest appears to have saved baseball for Roseburg in its present stage of development, at least for the present.

Because of the uncertainty of the lineup until Sunday's game, little has been said of it heretofore, but a definite starting roster, consisting primarily of experienced personnel, now takes the field under the name of Eagles.

At last five of the starters are in their early 30's, another veteran of baseball is in his late 20's, and the rest of the regulars are in the early 20 class. Right now the club is set in almost every position except catching, which Archie Anderson would as soon forsake for the outfield, his best-liked position.

Anderson who played locally last year, well probably be best remembered for a spell after running all the way to first in Sunday's game at Finlay Field with a broken bat handle in his hand, after severing said bat handle with a hit.

PITCHERS on the Eagles team are Chuck Verrell, recently of Roseburg High, and Bud Richardson of Myrtle Creek. In the pitching hands of the two lies much of any success which may come the way of Eagle baseball this year, and right now, prospects are definitely superior.

Around the infield it's Johnny Linde, ex-Roseburg Chief, at first base; Oliver Richardson, vice president of the Eagles Lodge from Myrtle Creek, at second base; Kenneth Forrest from last year's Eagles at short, and Carol Huston at third.

Because of a baseline accident in which Richardson was tromped on and suffered facial cuts from broken glasses in Sunday's game, his immediate baseball future is uncertain, depending on recovery.

Youthful Larry Ware of Roseburg and Keith Weaver of Tenmile go in center and left field for the Eagles, and Leland Rexroad, ex-Drain High and formerly of semi-pro teams in the Eugene-Veneta area, provides the experience in right.

THE LINEUP'S batting power lies in the 30-year-old frames of first baseman Linde and third sacker Huston.

While Roseburg has shaped up, the rest of the league play indicates a close race down the line, with almost every club holding an outside chance next to the defending champs.

Sutherlin, according to Manager Cal Probst, should be ready to go against Oakland this weekend in its first league start, and just to make things interesting in case any team has a feeling that it can't make a go of Evergreen ball this year, a good Glendale outfit to the south, currently playing the Rogue Valley circuit, would like

nothing better than affiliation with the county loop.

IN FACT, with the spirited play and the sudden spirited struggle for positions in the league, it appears that Evergreen League ball is here to stay.

"From little acorns grow..." goes the old saying, and it may be that in years to come, from the seemingly humble beginnings of the Roseburg Eagles, a top-flight semipro baseball team composed of local and imported talent, may some day be part of the Roseburg baseball picture.

It takes time to build any sound organization and to build public confidence. From the present crop of ball players in Eagle uniforms and the corps of fans supporting them could come the start of bigger things.

AFTER THAT START, though, it's going to still take good ball players, public support, and in the third and fourth places it's going to take financial backing and a good ball park to play in.

Business Manager Bill Chatham of the renowned Drain Black Sox, speaks of "risky enterprise" and "sharing responsibility" when quoting on the Black Sox success.

In Black Sox circles, there's more than one guy bearing the load financially and businesswise. The town has faith in its ball club under club President Harold Woolley and Vice Pres. Jim Whipple and businessmen, and supports the team to the tune of five and six hundred fans an outing.

It's an old story with Chatham and other successful enterprisers in nearby communities that Roseburg is big enough to be big time in everything. Everyone in Roseburg probably agrees with this theory — in theory — but for the present we'll go along with the bring 'em up from the grass roots school of thought.

When the time comes for Roseburg to go first class in baseball, Roseburg will be ready to support its team first class in first class surroundings.

MEANWHILE, the Evergreen League may prove to be but a proving ground for talent for other leagues around the country.

Wally Beamer, erstwhile Sutherlin hurler, is the most recent graduate going to the Coquille Loggers. Beamer had trouble keeping ahead of the batter and got raked up in his first Southern Oregon League start by the potent bats of Drain. One of the swats off Beamer was a 400-foot home run blow by Drain's Don Porter over the right field scoreboard, the longest hit ever made in the Drain ball park.

Porter was Drain's importee from Portland State College during the past couple of weeks while another possibility for the Black Sox continues to be Oregon State's all-Northern Division infielder Chuck Fish.

OTHER LOCALS to make the SOL grade this year are former Chief Hal Zuercher with the Medford Cheney Studs and Roy Harrington, back with Coquille. Zuercher played both games in center field when the Studs split with Grants last weekend, hitting one for six.

Hurley Wants Cockell Bout In July

SEATTLE — Jack Hurley, dour deacon of the Seattle fight game, rolled into town Monday from London and promptly announced he was trying to line up a fight for British heavyweight king Don Cockell here next month.

Returning with Hurley was his "Athlete," Harry (Kid) Matthews, who met Cockell at London's White City Stadium last Tuesday and came out on the short end of a 10-round decision.

It was the second time Matthews had dropped a decision to Cockell — the first time here last summer — and Hurley said:

"With a chance to fight Marcano (Rocky, world's heavy-weight champion), Cockell doesn't relish the idea of fighting Matthews again."

The Deacon said he didn't have another opponent for Cockell in mind yet if the Britisher doesn't want to tackle Matthews for a third time.

Asked what he and Matthews cleared on their London trip, Hurley hedged a bit said he had been asked not to disclose the exact amount but hinted rather obviously the net take was a tidy sum around the \$28,000 mark.
