The festive affair, organized into a "Let's Be Different Together" party and Council Fire, was held at the Chickyweemay's club room on Tuesday evening.

Chickyweemay girls, costumed in the native dress of foreign countries including India, Sweden, Yugoslavia, Saudi Arabia, China, Peru, Africa, Scotland and Hawaii, met and escorted their parents and other guests into The Elephant Walk, a "mixer."

The Council Fire was held around the Wobbe Board, with United Nations work as the theme. During the course of the ceremony, each member reported on her findings in studying the country chosen for the project. It was noted that all members have completed much more than the basic necessary requirements for the project, and have plans for extending this activity still farther. Guests contributed to the United Nations Children's Emergency Fund jar which the Chickyweemays have been making up. Its purpose and use was explained by Sharon Pepple.

Following the Council Fire, all the guests were taken on a tour of exhibit arrangements around the club room. Each exhibit, consisting of a figurine family, dwelling, animal life and other material representative of the many countries "visited" during the project, was examined and described by the girls. Of special interest were exhibits of American Indian lore, game and songs gathered and arranged by Sharon Pepple and Mrs. Cartwright as a part of a Camp Fire requirement. In compliance with the requirements for the rank of Torch Bearer Craftsman in Citizenship, Joyce Neavoll used Sweden's May Day Holiday as a theme for her portion of the general decoration refreshments and game period for the evening.
