

Senate Gives Amendment Overwhelming Approval

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has voted its overwhelming approval of a proposed constitutional amendment aimed at keeping Congress in business even if a atomic attack should wipe out many of its members.

The proposed amendment, approved 70-1 by the Senate, would empower state governors to appoint interim members of the House of Representatives if its roster should be severely cut. House vacancies can be filled under present law only by special elections.

Under the "atomic age" amendment, governors—who now can name Senate replacements in the event of death, resignation or ouster—would have authority to appoint temporary House members after a presidential proclamation that "by reason of acts of violence during a national emergency or national disaster" the number of House vacancies tops 145. At full strength, the House has 435 members.

The proposed amendment now goes to the House, where two-thirds approval of those voting is required to send it to the states for ratification by at least 36 of the 48 legislatures.

Sen. Ferguson (R-Mich) said the time to act "is before the calamities occur." Sen. Case (R-SD) noted that ratification by the state can take up to seven years and that an atomic or like disaster could break over the nation before that time has elapsed.

Regulating Of Natural Gas Prices Broadened

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court Monday greatly broadened the government's power to regulate natural gas prices.

By a 5-3 vote, the high tribunal ruled that the Federal Power Commission must fix rates for interstate sales of natural gas by companies which produce and gather it.

Two Alleged Sex Killers Jailed In New York City

NEW YORK (AP) — A schoolgirl rape victim died Sunday shortly after her alleged attacker was jailed without bail on charges of committing the assault and three other murders.

John Francis Roche, 37, a husky, steamfitter, was the first of two alleged sex killers seized by police over the weekend.

The second alleged killer, arrested Sunday, was Norman Royce, an 18-year-old Negro who police said admitted raping and killing three Negro women.

DIES IN CLUB FIRE

TILLAMOOK (AP) — Arthur E. Holden, 72, died in a fire which destroyed a night club here Saturday night.

He was sleeping upstairs in the Town Club when the blaze was discovered. Firemen tried but failed to reach him.

The blaze, which apparently started in the club's kitchen, did an estimated \$30,000 damage.

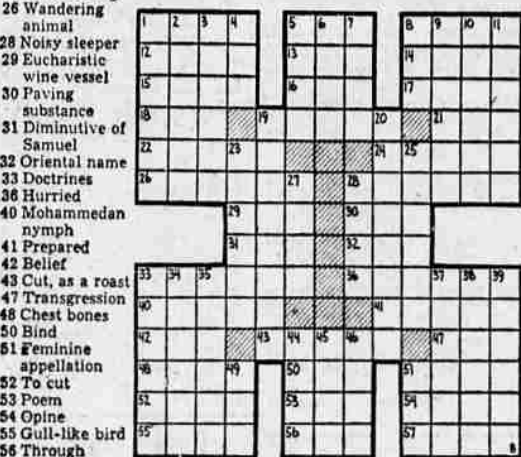
