

3 Portlanders Are Subpoenaed For Testimony

PORTLAND — A former dean of students at Portland's Reed College, a bookkeeper, and an automobile salesman said Tuesday they have been subpoenaed to testify at the House Un-American Activities Committee hearing here June 18-19.

Robert W. Cannon, 34, who resigned May 31 as a dean at Reed, said he submitted his resignation to the college before the scheduled hearings were announced. Duncan S. Ballantine, Reed president, said the subpoena had nothing to do with the resignation.

Cannon won Democratic nomination as state representative from Multnomah County in 1948 but was defeated in the general election.

Frank V. Patterson, 37, secretary of the Oregon Progressive Party in 1948, said he had received a subpoena but had decided not to cooperate with the committee of which Rep. Velde (R-Ill.) is chairman.

Patterson, who holds a bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Washington and a law degree from Northwestern College of Law, said he thought "committees such as the Velde committee are unconstitutional." Patterson is a part-time bookkeeper for several Portland firms.

John M. Dyhr, a 40-year-old automobile salesman, said he did not wish to discuss his subpoena. Dyhr was chairman at organization of a committee last Friday which voted to resist the Velde committee by urging long conferences between witnesses and attorneys to delay the hearing; picketing the Federal Courthouse where the hearing is to be held; and by newspaper advertising.

All witnesses subpoenaed to appear before the committee are not necessarily suspected of alien sympathies. Some friendly witnesses are expected to be called.

ing but declined to sign a formal agreement proffered by Symington.

Members of the subcommittee were still talking of a quick wind-up of the hearings, but McCarthy told reporters he probably will ask for a two weeks recess when Cohn leaves this week end for National Guard training at Camp Kilmer, N. J.

"That is my present plan," McCarthy said.

"I'll want him here. Roy knows more about this case than anybody else. We won't ask for any deferment of Roy (from training) at all."

Cohn, 27, is chief counsel to McCarthy's investigations subcommittee and was named by the Army along with McCarthy in the Army's charges of improper pressures to get preferential treatment for Schine, wealthy New Yorker who was an unpaid consultant to the subcommittee until drafted last fall.

James St. Clair, associate Army counsel, sought to draw from Cohn an admission there was no espionage at Ft. Monmouth after Stevens took office. Cohn said there was "a very dangerous situation" that had a high espionage potential.

St. Clair also asked Cohn whether he thought Maj. Gen. Kirke Lawton, commander at Ft. Monmouth, was "critical" of Stevens in testimony before the McCarthy subcommittee on delays in getting rid of security risks.

Cohn replied he thought Gen. Lawton was "reluctantly critical" because he could not get any cooperation from Stevens before the McCarthy committee began its investigation of Communists in the Army radar set-up.

Police Break Up Thrill Bombings Of Rich Youths

BETHESDA, Md. — Three youths from well-to-do families were held by county authorities Wednesday in what police called the breakup of a "thrill" bombing outbreak that had terrorized the fashionable Bethesda-Chevy Chase suburban area on the outskirts of Washington.

Two more were freed under bond of \$2,000 each and three others were released to their parents. Police said they expected seven to ten additional arrests of teenagers, believed to have been minor participants in the series of blasts.

The roundup was made Tuesday only a few hours before, police said, the boys' plan called for a homemade bomb to be set off at the Bethesda police station.

Five bombings and an attempted arson, police said, already had been directed at school officials' homes, another private residence, a business house and a public library in the last two months. No body had been injured and police quoted the boys as saying they had no intention to injure any person.

Glendale Youth Meted 90-Day Jail Sentence

An 18-year-old Glendale resident Wilbur Lee Pettijohn, was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail Tuesday when he pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny under \$75. The charge had been reduced from grand larceny.

Pettijohn was arrested in Las Vegas, Nev., last week and returned here by a sheriff's deputy after Melitta Burke complained that Pettijohn stole clothes, a wrist watch and an electric shaver.

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Plywood Leaders To Spur Promotion To Keep Abreast Of Industry's Rapid Growth

Top-flight management spokesmen outlined before 250 plywood leaders in annual meeting at Gearhart plans for a continuing plywood promotion campaign to match this booming industry's expanded output.

In his keynote address, Eberly Thompson, president of the industry's trade association and executive vice president of M and M Wood Working Co., Portland, told the panel growth of the industry.

He pointed out that sales in 1954 are outrunning last year's record high by 6 per cent and nearly three times that of 1946. Since World War II, the number of producing units has grown from 33 to 97 plants.

"The industry increased sales last year by 20 per cent and per capita consumption of fir plywood is still rising," he said. Last year, however, new production capacity outstripped the increase in sales according to the speaker.

Thompson called upon individual manufacturers to maintain the highest possible standards of quality, to strengthen their selling organizations and to re-examine their sales and marketing policies to "enlist plywood distributors and retail lumber dealers in a concerted plywood sales effort."

Salesmen To Be Trained
Reviewing the results of current industry sales promotion, E. W. Daniels, chairman of the industry trade association's policy-making management committee, and past president of Harbor Plywood Corp., Aberdeen, Wash., told the panel makers that fir plywood "lends itself to all forms of promotion."

Daniels said that this year plywood advertising will make 475 million impressions, carrying the themes "More Profit in '54," "Cut Costs in '54," and "Better Built-ins With Fir Plywood." He said field promotion representatives will make 24,000 personal calls on architects, builders, industrial buyers and other specifiers.

Reflecting the theme of the meeting, "A Year of Education," Daniels discussed plans for training of plywood salesmen this summer at a "plywood school" in Tacoma which he said is the forerunner of a broad program of sales training.

About 50 new plans for fir plywood projects are being developed, Daniels said, in an all-out effort to capitalize fully on the cresting "do-it-yourself" movement which he described as the "biggest marketing development since the advent of the self-service grocery store."

Trustees re-elected include: Monford Orloff, general manager, Mt. Baker Plywood, Inc., Bellingham, Wash.; George D. Jaynes, general manager, North Pacific Plywood, Inc., Tacoma; Robert Beggs, president of Humboldt Plywood Corp., Marshfield, Wis.; and F. L. Foval, manager of factory sales, The Long-Bell Lumber Co., Longview, Wash.

Plywood firms elected members of the association included: Centralia Plywood, Inc., Centralia, Wash.; Medford Veneer & Plywood Corp., Medford; Willamette Builders Supply Co., Astoria, Ore.; and Western States Plywood Cooperative, Port Orford.

Other speakers to appear include: Reno Odlin, president, Puget Sound National Bank, Tacoma, and W. E. Difford, managing director of the industry trade promotion association with Tacoma headquarters.

Drain Contracts Study Of City Water System

The Drain City Council Tuesday night hired a Corvallis consulting engineering firm to make a survey of the city's water system. City Recorder Vern Thomas said work by Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield will "begin right away." The survey is expected to take place through the summer, giving the engineers an opportunity to measure water flow at high peaks.

Plans for future expansion are expected to be recommended by the firm. The city contracted the job for \$1,275.

In other civic works, Thomas said the roof now is being put on the new city hall, which is being built by volunteer labor and material donors. The city hall is expected to be completed without resort to taxation.
