

Riddle School, City Budgets Are Outlined

At the June dinner meeting of the Riddle Chamber of Commerce, the city and school budgets for the coming year were outlined and discussion invited. The meeting was at Ford's Cafe.

Russell Weimer representing the city council finance committee reported that the city budget had been streamlined to cut the tax levy by approximately one-third of that of the previous year.

The total figure is set at \$32,737.50, with \$15,005.21 above the six per cent limitation. The total millage this year will be approximately 92.7 as compared with 153.8 last year.

Weimer also reported that the state emergency fund has allowed \$15,000 for needed street improvement between the postoffice and the primary school building, and that all easements have now been secured for rerouting the city water system.

Both the council and the chamber went on record as favoring an affirmative vote on June 14 on the use of the special fund of \$4,300 received from Harbor Plywood Corp. for forwarding the completion of the Riddle City Hall.

Supt. Kenneth A. Stuart explained the portion of the school budget to be voted on in the June 21 election which was not affected by the rural school board levy approved last month in a county-wide vote.

The amount of the budget this year is \$49,063, which is \$6,254 less than last year, despite salary increases for teachers approximating \$200 each, the addition of a full time music teacher, and new student insurance providing complete coverage, and amounting to \$1,100.00.

Congress has voted to extend the deadline.

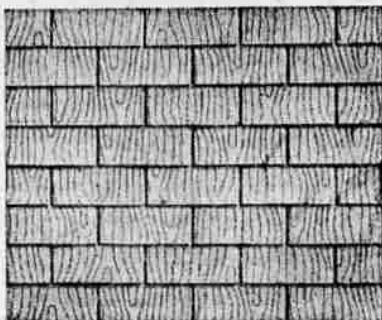
