

### 4 Orders Signed Admitting Estate To Probate Court

### Eisenhower Pledges Fight Against Subversion

and he pleaded: "Let us, therefore, not rest until these laws are passed."

He was interrupted 32 times by applause with the biggest demonstrations coming when he said:

1. Promised to "keep everlastingly at the job of uprooting subversion wherever it may be found." He said he felt he was not being egotistical in saying, "Every American believes that of me."

2. Declared with respect to his controversial plan to shift from rigid to flexible lower-level farm price supports that he is "completely unmoved by arguments as to what constitute good or winning policies." He said he has been told by many that the farm plan — already once voted down by the House Agriculture Committee — is not good politics in an election year.

Even though he has not been in politics very long, he said, "I know that what is right for America is politically right."

He touched off a round of laughter with his only allusion to the Army-McCarthy controversy: "In spite of highly publicized distractions, Congress has been hard at work."

Then he ticked off progress on appropriations bills, highway construction legislation, tax cuts, approval of the St. Lawrence sea-way project and ratification of a mutual security treaty with South Korea.

"But much still remains which is of vital importance to every American citizen," he declared.

### French Pound Rebel Positions

HANOI, Indochina (AP) — French airmen flying U.S.-supplied fighters struck in the night against two Vietminh guerrilla bases with an ammunition dump on the rebel regulars massed menacingly around the delta's rim.

A French spokesman announced 50 tons of high explosives were loosed on the ammunition dump at Yen Bay, on the Red River 75 miles northwest of Hanoi, and on two guerrilla concentrations.

Elsewhere in the delta, the spokesman said, French Union troops pushed mop-up operations against the guerrillas and infiltrating units of Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap's Red command. He said 23 rebels were killed and three captured Thursday.

Gen. Paul Ely, France's new military and political chief in Indochina, arrived here Thursday night with the promise he would lead the fight against the Communist-led rebels in the area. Ely said he had come to Hanoi from Saigon because he believed the commander in chief should be with his fighting men.

### Portland Will Undergo Theoretical Bomb Attack

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's civil defense organizations will get their first big drill next Monday when Portland undergoes a theoretical bomb attack.

The warning of the impending "bombing" will be broadcast at 7 a. m., with the attack scheduled for 8:25 a. m.

### Famed Folkdance Instructor Will Visit Roseburg

Vyts Belajus, the foremost authority on folkdancing and folklore, will be in Roseburg for three hours on Saturday evening, June 19.

Audrey S. Lindell of the sponsoring Roseburg International Folk Dancers said Belajus will be at Riverside School gym from 8 to 11 p. m. to teach dancers.

Mrs. Lindell said all folk, square, round and international dances are invited to spend an inspiring evening with "Mr. Folk Dancing," as Belajus is sometimes known.

She said Belajus is internationally known, and has been teaching since 1932. He has taught in more than 200 colleges and universities in the United States and Canada.

He has authored five books on folkdancing and folklore to spread his knowledge of European, Near Eastern, Mexican and American dances. He also publishes a magazine called Viltis, a name which means "hope" in Lithuanian.

Twice Belajus has been hospitalized with tuberculosis of the throat and doctors gave him only weeks or hours to live. Mrs. Lindell says his return to health is an amazing story of indomitable courage, prayer and hope. From a hospital bed and in a wheelchair he worked to put out his magazine so that he might reach his thousands of friends.

Belajus is making a tour of the Northwest, during which he will teach at the University of Washington, Oregon State College, Salem, Portland, Klamath Falls, Seattle, Enumclaw and Roseburg.

He will return to his post as a faculty member at the two foremost folk dance camps in California — Stockton and Idlewild — when he completes his tour.

### Break In Overcast Predicted Very Soon

Cloud-weary residents may hold out hopes for a break in the overcast within the next few days, the weatherman reports. The weather will be slightly warmer, he says, however, temperatures will remain below normal for the period.

High temperatures will range from 64 to 74 and lows will span 48-52 degrees. Showers may be expected early in the period, and again Sunday night or Monday. There will be considerable sunshine likely Sunday and again on Tuesday or Wednesday, he predicts. Total precipitation will reach one to three-tenths of an inch.

### Jenkins Says McCarthy Reversed Memorandum

looked into McCarthy's financial affairs in 1952 and raised several questions about them. One was whether McCarthy made personal use of funds given him for his fight against communism. McCarthy did not testify before the group.

Flanders earlier had gone to the hearing room to serve notice on McCarthy that he was to appear there he was inclined to think Flanders' attacks were owing to "senility" rather than "viciousness," Flanders is 73.

As to Gen. Lawton, Jenkins said McCarthy had testified that Army counselor John G. Adams told him the Army was considering removing Lawton from command of Monmouth because of Lawton's statement to staff officers that graduates of certain colleges appeared to have Communist predilections.

Adams has testified that is what he told McCarthy, and Stevens has testified that was in fact the reason Lawton's removal was considered.

Jenkins noted that in a Dec. 17 memorandum, which McCarthy had produced earlier from his files, McCarthy quoted Adams as saying the motive for "breaking" Lawton was the general's cooperation with the McCarthy investigations subcommittee.

It appeared to him there was a direct contradiction between McCarthy's own testimony and McCarthy's memorandum, Jenkins said.

McCarthy insisted there was no genuine contradiction.

Jenkins said the hearing record lists four instances when McCarthy reportedly made specific statements to top Army people that there should be no special favors to Schine, including a letter to Secretary of the Army Stevens last Dec. 22.

"Why, senator, did you do that if you didn't know that Mr. Cohn or somebody was putting too much pressure on the Army?" Jenkins demanded.

Roy M. Cohn is chief counsel to McCarthy's investigations subcommittee and is accused by the Army, along with McCarthy, of exerting improper pressures on behalf of Schine.

McCarthy replied that he disagrees there were four instances. But that "I've always taken the position" that his staff should have no special favors.

McCarthy denied he ever asked Stevens to assign Schine to the New York area as Stevens testified.

And McCarthy swore it was not true, as Adams testified, that Adams came to him on last Dec. 9 and complained he could no longer take "abuse" from Cohn on the subject of Schine.

McCarthy didn't dispute that he once told Stevens — as a monitored telephone call records — that Cohn thought Schine "should be a general and work from a penthouse of the Waldorf."

But McCarthy said that was "completely facetious" — that he was only "ribbing" the secretary.

**Grammer Goes To Death Friday For Wife Murder**

BALTIMORE (AP) — George Edward Grammer, once a prosperous New York businessman, dropped to his death from Maryland's gallows early Friday for the murder that was almost a "perfect crime."

The state accused Grammer of beating to death his 33-year-old wife on a sultry August night in 1932 so he could be free to marry a pretty United Nations secretary.

Grammer admitted he killed his wife, but he claimed he hadn't planned the crime.

The body of the mother of three little girls was found in an automobile, smashed by a wild careening drive down a Baltimore hill.

Police found a pebble lodged beneath the accelerator to force it into an open position. Their alert discovery led to a trail of damning evidence and the 37-year-old New Yorker's ultimate conviction.

Grammer earned \$600 a month as office manager of the Climax Molybdenum Co. It was testified at his trial that he had an "almost unlimited" expense account. State prosecutors put into evidence love letters Grammer had written to Mathilda Mizibrocky, of Hamilton, Ont., a vivacious brunette employed by United Nations.

He loved her and wanted to marry her, state prosecutors argued. They produced testimony that the two spent at least one week together in a swank Chicago hotel on Grammer's fancy expense account. She testified she never knew he was married.

### A. N. Orcutt Will Be Honored

A. N. (Bert) Orcutt, who started his career in law 50 years ago in Roseburg, will be honored by the Douglas County Bar Assn. tonight at the Country Club.

Orcutt, who moved to Portland about a year ago, retired the first of the year from the old firm of Orcutt, Long, Neuner and Davis, Roseburg attorneys-at-law.

He since has been appointed circuit judge pro tempore by the State Supreme Court, and has heard circuit court cases here and in Portland.

R. L. Whipple will act as master of ceremonies at the dinner, which starts at 6:30 p. m. W. A. Dahlberg, professor of speech at the University of Oregon, will speak. Several old friends of the veteran attorney will be present at the dinner, as will Mrs. Orcutt.

The banquet will mark completion of 50 years Orcutt has been a member of the Oregon State Bar.

### Power Steering Cost Will Be Much Lower

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP) — Power steering installations for passenger cars are going to be greatly simplified — and much cheaper.

This was predicted Friday by experts here for the Society of Automotive Engineers summer meeting. The five-day meeting ends Friday.

Power steering devices presently range in price from \$135 to about \$200. One manufacturer reportedly is aiming at a 1955 price of \$100 for a factory installation.

Francis W. Davis, Waltham, Mass., engineer who held basic patents on power steering devices, said he now is working on further simplification of the unit. Many of Davis' patents have expired, but he says about 50 per cent of the units currently in use are of his design.

### Judge Overrules Copco Demurrer In Staggs Suit

The \$111,000 damage suit by Ezra Staggs against the California Oregon Power Co. is still alive today after Circuit Judge Pro Tom Barnett Goldstein overruled a demurrer by the company.

Copco was allowed 10 days in which to make an answer.

The suit grew out of an accident near the Idlewild store while Staggs was setting off dynamite while working for Ed Funderburk.

Staggs charges he was badly burned by electricity when a dynamite blast hurled the end of a wire he was holding over a Copco high tension line. The accident allegedly occurred July 31, 1952.

The complaint states Copco was requested many weeks before the accident to remove the lines from the construction area. It states that instead, the company relocated them obliquely across the area.

According to the complaint the wire Staggs was holding was used to set off the blast. When it went over the high tension line (11,500 volts), the wire acted as a carrying agent of the heavy voltage into Staggs' body, the complaint says. Staggs said he suffered third degree burns to the scalp, hands, chest and right leg. He demands \$105,000 general and \$6,899.22 special damages.

### Famed Song Writer Will Rossiter Passes

CHICAGO (AP) — Will Rossiter, 87, dean of American music publishers and best known as the composer of "I'd Love to Live in Loveland," died last night after a short illness.

Rossiter, known to thousands as "Uncle Will," began his publishing career after composing his first song, "Sweet Nellie Bawn," in 1890. Among the more famous songs he published were "Some of These Days," "Darktown Strutters' Ball" and "Turkey in the Straw." He used the pseudonym W. R. Williams in his own song writing.

He was born in Wells, Somerset, England, and came to the United States at the age of 14.

### Search Resumes For More Bodies On Patient's Land

COSHOCTON, Ohio (AP) — Central Ohio authorities, fearful of what their search might produce, planned today to return to the farm of a former mental patient which has yielded two bodies in the past six days.

Last Saturday the body of Clyde Patton, a 28-year-old Fresno School teacher and part-time auto salesman, was found in the plowed furrows of a field on the farm of Cletus Reese, 36.

Police said Patton had disappeared after demonstrating a car to Reese June 2.

Reese, a husky, barrel-chested man, was charged with first-degree murder.

Authorities said while they were questioning him about Patton's death, Reese told them he killed another man—Lester Melick, 38, of Danville. He later denied it.

Yesterday Melick's son Harry, searching for his father's body, noticed an unusual contour in the land about 200 yards from Reese's house. Sheriffs from Coshocton and Knox counties dug at the spot. Out of a shallow grave came the body — not of Melick who had been missing since last Nov. 28, but of another unidentified man.

The head had been crushed, like Patton's.

### Rose Festival Turns To Children, Roses

PORTLAND (AP) — The Rose Festival turned to the children—and roses—Friday under cloudy skies that held only a small threat of scattered showers.

Portland's 66th annual rose show, held in conjunction with the Rose Festival, was opened by the festival's Queen Jan. That followed a "knighting" ceremony at which a variety of visiting dignitaries were honored.

The day got off to a musical start with a downtown concert by the Women in Air Force band from San Antonio, Tex., and music continued as assorted bands marched through the city in preliminary maneuvers to the junior parade in the afternoon.
