U.S. Recognition Of Canada Makes Her Great Ally

SEATTLE (AP)—Recognition by the United States of the rights and sovereign privileges of the Canadian nation despite "an overwhelming balance of power" has given this nation a great ally, a Canadian editor told the Rotary international convention.

Bruce Hitchison, editor of the Victoria, B. C., Daily Times, said in a speech prepared for delivery that the lessons learned in the international friendship "must be learned by the entire world, and soon, if it is to avoid suicide by hydrogen."

"Canada," he said, "has always been the supreme test of American morals, the ultimate trial of the American conscience—yes, and a glittering, golden temptation which few great powers could have resisted."

By resisting this great temptation, Hitchison declared, America "does not find a conquered, sullen and restless satellite, only awaiting the chance of freedom, revenge and alliance with foreign conspirators. It finds its closest ally. It finds also its largest foreign market and the source of essential supplies without which, by the way, the United States could not even begin to fight a foreign war."

"And, therefore," he said, "let the Malenkows, the Molotovs, the Vishnys and their weary ventriloquist dummies mouth their slanders on American morals, for the very fact of Canada's existence of itself disproves them."

The convention, attended by 8,000 delegates, will conclude Thursday after hearing a speech by Secretary of State Dulles.

Oregon REA Opposes Plan For Partnership

PORTLAND (AP)—Bills by Sen. Guy Cordon and Rep. Sam Coon authorizing "partnership" construction of John Day Dam, are opposed by the Oregon Rural Electric Cooperative Assn.

President Lee Wooden of Jewell, said the association held a special meeting in Portland and that delegates had unanimously approved a resolution opposing the partnership bills, introduced in the House and Senate by the Oregon Republicans.

The bills would permit public and private utilities of Oregon to form a partnership for financing power features of the federal project to be located 25 miles up the Columbia River from The Dalles Dam.

The association's resolution said the cooperatives opposed the partnership program because they believe the bills:

1. Tend to further weaken the anti-monopoly provision of the Bonneville Act and other statutes relative to the sale of power for Columbia River dams.
2. Tend to destroy the principle of regionwide development of Columbia River power on an integrated basis.
3. Will unnecessarily increase the cost of power.

Wheat Crop Estimate Now Placed Much Higher

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department Thursday forecast this year's wheat crop at 999,561,000 bushels.

This estimate was 67,561,000 bushels more than last month's prediction of about 932,000,000 bushels. It compares with last year's production of 1,168,536,000 bushels and with the 1,088,548,000 bushels.

This year's wheat crop is being grown and sold under rigid government restrictions calling for a reduction of nearly 50 per cent in plantings. On hand is a record reserve of about 875,000,000 bushels from previous crops.

Thursday's estimate put the total wheat supply at a level which will require Secretary of Agriculture Benson to extend production and marketing controls on the 1955 crop.

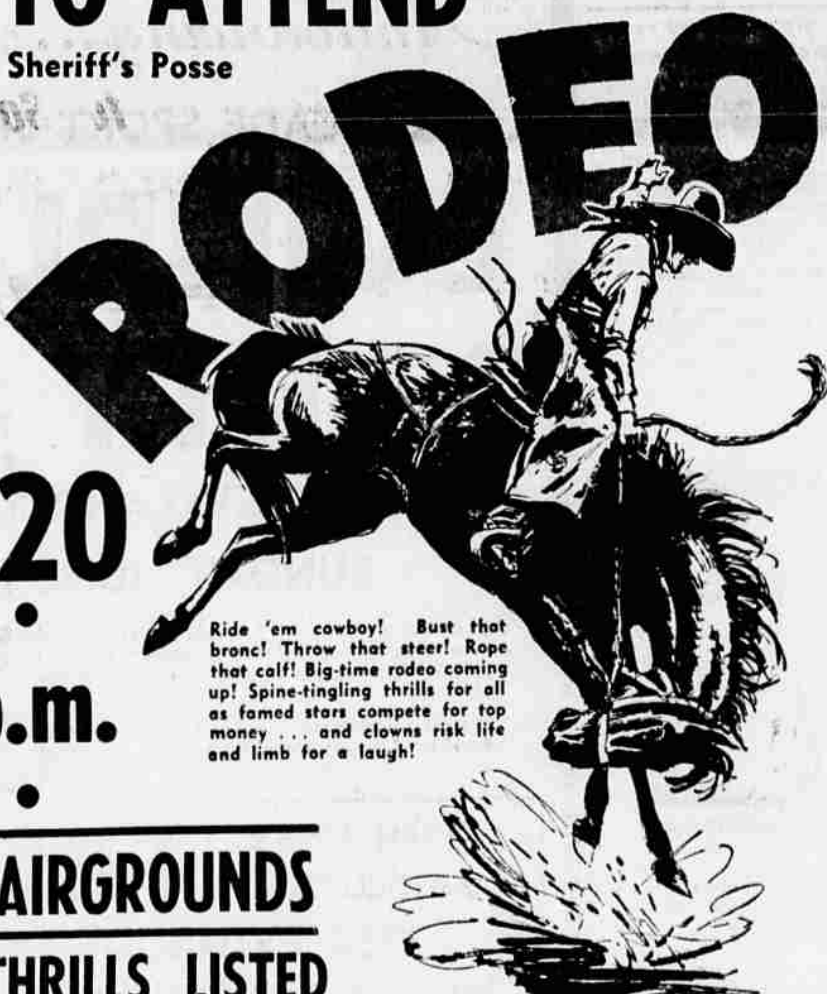
