Amy Lee Arney, head of the piano department of Linfield College, spent Monday and Tuesday in Roseburg giving Syllabus Examinations for the Oregon Music Teachers' Association.

Mrs. Arney who has her Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music is well known as an ensemble artist and pianist. She did a great deal of concert work in the East and has become well-known as a fine pianist in the Northwest. Before coming to Linfield College, she was on the faculty at the Cincinnati Conservatory as accompanist and coach and also taught at Greenbrier College for Women in Lewisburg, W. Va. She is also adjudicating in Salem, Eugene, and Cottage Grove.
