

Student Claims High Explosive Totally Harmless

BALTIMORE (AP) — Hugh Montague, 20-year-old graduate student at Johns Hopkins University, said Saturday 17 pounds of high explosive he left at the university's

recreation hall was "totally harmless." Finding of the cache in a Levee Hall cloakroom touched off a bomb scare on the campus Friday. Montague was arrested and charged with illegally storing explosives.

Army demolition experts first identified them as TNT and M-3, another military explosive, and said they were highly dangerous. Montague, whose hobby is explosives, said today the material is C-2, even more powerful, and he had kept it under his bed at an apartment house near the campus for two years.

"You couldn't set it off if you wanted to," Montague said. "It is completely insensitive to shock. You could drop it from the top of the Empire State building and it would only go pop. Temperatures of 2,000 to 30,000 degrees are required to set it off."

Montague's father, an Air Force colonel at Dayton, O., came here for the son's preliminary hearing, scheduled before a police magistrate next Tuesday afternoon.

Young Montague said the study of the effects of explosives is a

hobby with him. He said he left the material in Levee Hall temporarily while he was arranging to leave town.

Lolita Begged To Join Group In House Spree

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dark-eyed Mrs. Lolita Lebron says she begged to join three other Puerto Rican Nationalists and "to die with them" in a shooting demonstration in the House of Representatives.

Mrs. Lebron, 34, spoke emotionally on the witness stand in federal court — the first of four Puerto Rican independence-seekers to testify at their trial on multiple assault charges in connection with the March 1 shooting of five Congress members.

The other defendants are Rafael Cancel Miranda, 25, Andres Figueroa Cordero, 29, and Irving Flores Rodriguez, 28. Each faces up to 75 years in prison if convicted on charges of assault with a dangerous weapon and assault with intent to kill. The case is expected to go to the jury next Tuesday.

At one point in her dramatic testimony, Mrs. Lebron declared: "God know I am not guilty." She said the four Nationalists came to Washington expecting to die as a sacrifice to the cause of Puerto Rican independence.

"What I did I don't deny," she said. "But we didn't think to kill. We thought of dying."

As the only one of the four defendants to speak English with any degree of ease, Mrs. Lebron has acted as spokesman and leader ever since the shooting in the House chamber.
