A total of \$1,300,000 in state funds was listed as deposited in the bank in Hoffman's hometown. Three top division employees were suspended as a result of the probe of the division, the governor announced. A fourth employee resigned.

Meyner, Richman and State Commissioner of Banking and Insurance Warren Gaffney said they have not yet determined how the false certification affects \$300,000 Hoffman confessed he embezzled prior to 1938.

District Judge Fines, Reprimands Tye Vandals

District Judge Elmer Baldwin dealt out some stern reprimands and placed five of the seven boys who have been arrested for vandalism of Canby Tye on probation in a court session Monday.

A total of seven 17- and 18-year-olds were arrested by the sheriff's office on charges of destroying and defacing property at the Camp Fire Girl's Camp Tye between Elkton and Sutherlin. All seven are from Sutherlin. Three of the boys had been returned from Portland after having enlisted in the armed forces.

After the reprimand Monday, Judge Baldwin fined Jerald Nelson, 18, \$50 and suspended the fine with a year's probation. He allowed Fred Randall, 13, Nelson and one of the 17-year-old boys to return to the service. The 17-year-old and two others were fined \$10 each, but this fine was also suspended and the boys were placed on probation for a year.

Earlier, another 17-year-old was fined \$250 and given a 30-day jail sentence for the same crime of defacing a building and its contents.

The only boy to plead innocent, Lee Andrew Williams, is out on bail.

All were arrested after a drinking party which turned the Tye camp into a shambles, Sheriff Cal Baird said.

Band Concert At Umpqua Park Wednesday Night

Outdoor band concerts will again become a feature of Roseburg summers when the reorganized city band begins its first concert of the season Wednesday at 8 p. m.

In order to provide a pleasant location for more people to hear the concerts either from cars or on lawns or benches, the location has been moved to Umpqua Park. Work is being rushed by city officials to complete a platform for use of the band, using materials donated by two local mills.

Band Director Tom Hall promises an interesting evening of music as he leads the 40-piece band, composed of adults and high school players, through a variety of marches, show tunes, and "pops." Hall is the high school band director, coming to Roseburg this year from Iowa.

Band concerts have been scheduled at two-week intervals throughout the summer on Thursday evenings, this one being advanced to Wednesday because of activities connected with the Rodeo. It is hoped that these concerts at the park will make concert nights the family night at the park. With the elimination of the one-way detour on the road to the park it is believed that road conditions will no longer discourage attendance at events in that area.

Bullard admitted being the father of three children, but it was brought out in court that he had been living with Miss Marquette in Roseburg.

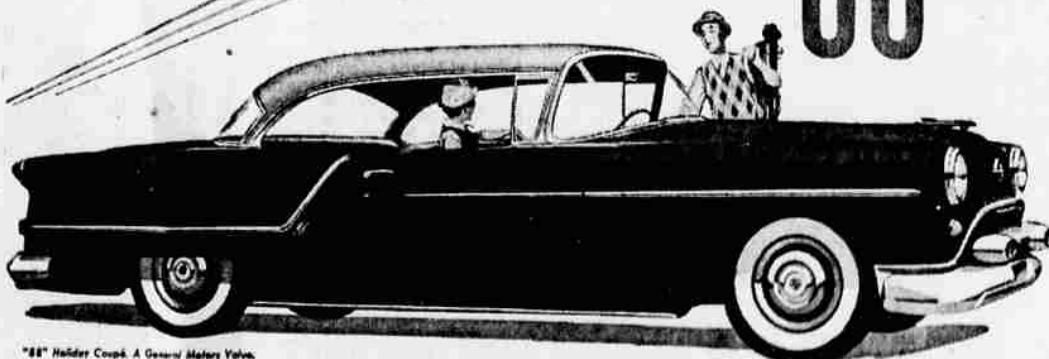
