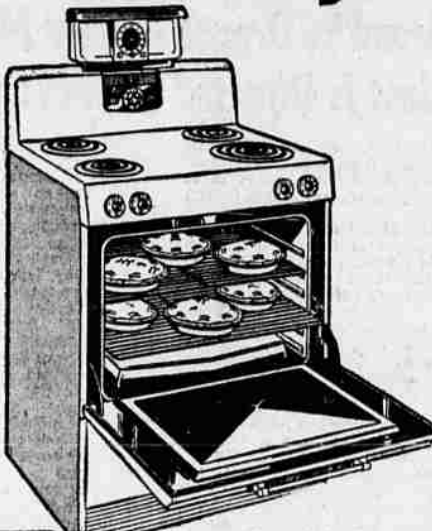

New Construction In 1954 Will Set All-Time Spending Mark, Industry Predicts

WASHINGTON (AP)—A government report, based upon a new look at the thriving construction industry, predicts that spending for new construction would set an all-time record of \$64.4 billion dollars, the peak year so far.

The new prediction, after five months of record-setting construction activity in this year, reversed the earlier forecast made by the Commerce and Labor departments.

Last November the two government units estimated construction this year would fall about 2 percent under the 1953 record level. The dollar total predicted last November for 1954 was \$4 billion dollars. Two billion under the new forecast.

The more optimistic outlook, the report said, was based mainly on the high level of new home building so far this year. However, most other major categories of construction, with the exception of federally financed building, also showed predicted gains over 1953.

The construction forecast was particularly significant in that it pointed to no slackening of employment in this major field of jobs during the balance of this year.

Details Of Forecast
Today's report included these details:

1. Current indications are that 1,080,000 new, private nonfarm dwelling units will be started this year. It was estimated that new, nonfarm residential building, along with spending for additions and alterations, would account this year for \$12,125,000,000 or 2 per cent more than the record in 1953.
2. Outlays for new commercial construction of all types are ex-

pected to exceed two billion dollars, for the first time.

3. Religious building and private educational building will also set new records at about \$25 million dollars each.

4. Spending for private industrial construction such as factories, which is on a long-term downturn, was expected to drop 13 per cent to \$1,950,000,000 from the 1953 rate of \$2,229,000,000.

McCarthy's Foo Gets 'Crackpot Threats'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Flanders (R-Vt), outspoken foe of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis), has been told by anonymous telephone callers that he will "be taken care of."

Special police precautions have been ordered although Flanders' top aide said Monday he considered the calls to be merely "crackpot threats."

Harry T. Laffin, Flanders' administrative assistant, said the senator has received "six or eight" telephone calls from persons who told him they would take care of him or would come to his office to beat him up.

Laffin said no request had been made for police protection.

Higher Education Board Gets Salary Boost Request

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Board of Higher Education was asked Monday to raise salaries of faculty members at state-supported institutions of higher learning.

Four professors representing faculties requested increased salary funds in the 1955-57 biennial budget. They said faculty instructors are receiving less take-home pay than in 1939 when the increased cost of living is considered and that raises have not kept pace with those of other occupations.

The faculty spokesmen were

Edmond Cyker, University of Oregon; Ralph Boyd, Oregon State College; Arthur Taylor, Southern Oregon College of Education, and T. S. Peterson, Portland State College.

Other Action Taken
The board took their request under advisement.

In other action board committees suggested formation of a committee to study metropolitan colleges with a view to working out a positive program for Portland State's physical plant.

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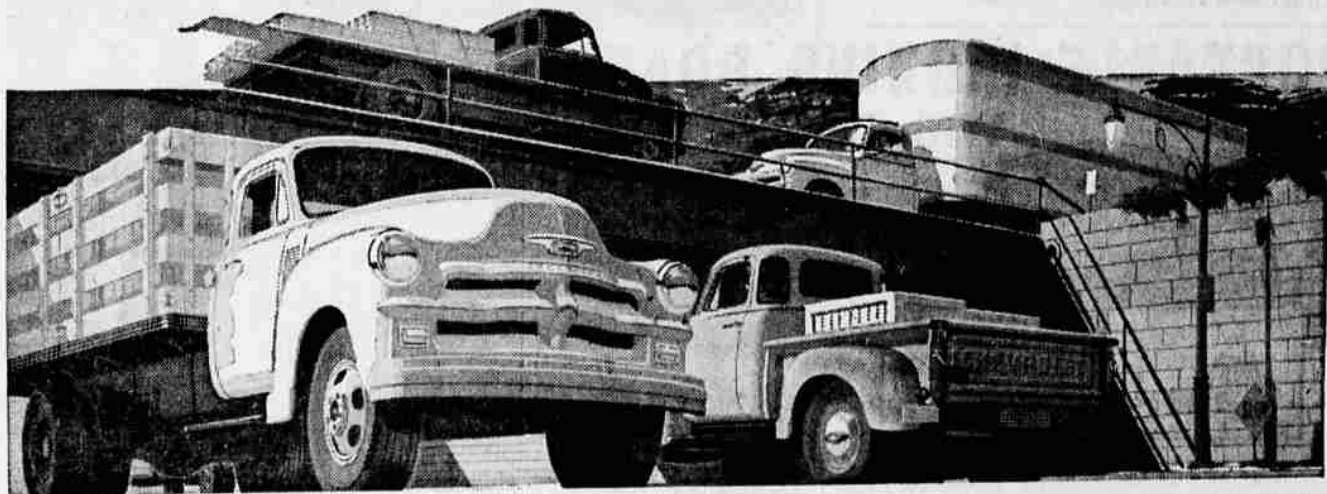
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
