New In Books

MARY ANNE. By Daphne du Maurier. Doubleday.

The Second son of George III misbehaved himself so royally that history suggests, he helped drive his father insane. Whatever Americans might dislike, his subjects at home had their own special complaint: His offspring, the Duke of York, Army Commander-in-Chief, for six months over of Mary Anne Thompson (Farguhar) Clarke.

It was a merry half year the Duke lived to regret. Mary Anne, whose own father was Thompson, whose stepfather was Farguhar, whose husband was Clarke, had looks and brains. There was straight Scotch in her, but she was brought up in crowded London where she observed all sorts of unsavory but useful examples.

While her husband deceived her about his position, she deceived him worse. She followed the primrose path in order to put her children on easy street. The Duke allowed her much less money than it cost to run the establishment where she entertained him, and she made up the difference by selling Army commissions. At a trial it was decided he hadn't known what she was doing, but nobody except the court believed that, and he lost the Army command.

Miss du Maurier's vivid pages are spiced with the scrounging, the greed, the deceit and the mean appetites of the poor, and with the scrounging, greed, deceit and appetites of the rich and noble. In Mary Anne's rise there is a real drama, the trial scenes are exciting, and when true love flowers, it's all the sweeter by contrast with the sordid.
