State Bond Commission To Buy Sutherlin Issue

The Sutherlin Sun reports that the State Bond Commission has agreed to purchase the sewer bonds voted by Sutherlin last year.

The Sun says a purchase of the entire amount necessary depends only on approval of the bond attorneys. The amount authorized in the vote was \$475,000, but the state will purchase bonds only in the amount of funds needed. The Sun says the latest engineer's estimates are \$433,000.

The average interest rate on the bonds will be 3 per cent.

Velde Committee Hearing In Portland Centers Around Reed College Associates

PORTLAND — The Velde Committee opened its hearing here Friday and at once went into what looks to be an investigation of Reed College.

The first witness was Homer Leroy Owen, 30, of Huntington, W. Va., who identified himself as a Reed student from 1945 to 1950.

While here, he said, he was politically naive and ignorant and in successive steps joined the American Veterans Committee, the Young Progressives and finally in the spring of 1947, the Communist Party.

He said he quit the party in January, 1952.

He said that another student, named Joan Rosenbaum, joined with him.

Chairman Harold Velde (R-III) made an opening statement for his committee, officially the House Un-American Activities Committee, in which he said he understood Communist influence to be not as great in Portland as elsewhere in the country—nor as in Seattle.

The committee was surprised, he said, to find so many subversive influences in Seattle.

This statement was viewed as explaining why the committee split into two parts, one continuing in Seattle session which started Monday and was to have closed Thursday. Here with Velde was Rep. Frazier (D-Tenn.).

Velde said he could understand why people might have joined the Communist Party some years back, but he said that by 1947 it was clear it was a party of subversives. He asked Owen why he joined at so late a date. That was when Owen said he was politically naive.

After he had been in the party for a time, he said, he joined the John Reed Club and he went on to name 20 persons, all but one of them students, who he said were club members. He did not identify them as other than Portlanders.

The club, he said, was a unit of the Communist Party. He said one of the members was John

Allen Fellowship Award Announced

BAKER — James J. Weeks, managing editor of The Dailies Chronicle, has been selected for the Eric W. Allen Memorial Fellowship at the University of Oregon.

The selection came Friday evening during the annual convention of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Assn., attended by 100 delegates.

Roseburg was picked for next year's convention, also scheduled in June.

The fellowship, established in 1952 under a grant from the Eugene Register-Guard, allows a practicing newspaperman to return for a year of academic work. It is a memorial to the late dean of the university's school of journalism.

Speakers at the Friday morning program were William H. Totten, classified advertising manager of the Klamath Falls Herald and News; Charles L. Nicholson, Beverly Hills, Calif., newspaper consultant; and William W. Knight, publisher of the Oregon Journal.

W. Arthur Steele of the Clatskanie Chief is ONPA president.

Langlie Tangles With Russian Geneva Delegates

OLYMPIA — Gov. Langlie has tangled with the Russian delegates to the International Labor Conference in Geneva, Switzerland, his office disclosed Thursday.

In a transcribed interview made in Geneva and airmailed here to be played for reporters, Langlie, U. S. delegate to the convention, declared:

"... Generally Russia has done about everything it could have done up to this moment to interrupt the peaceful movement of this conference.

"She was here scarcely a day when she tried to elbow her way out of the important selections committee. It was only a matter of 24 hours before the normal procedure would have taken care of the problem she raised.

"It appears from everything that I can see that they are here to make trouble in any way they can and to disrupt the orderly processes of the ILO and also to do anything they can to embarrass the United States of America."

Despite the Russian tactics, Langlie said "I am satisfied there will be a better feeling among the various nations after the conference than there was before."

Sixty countries are participating.
