Open-House Affair Is Given Mrs. Neuberger

Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, member of the Oregon State legislature and wife of the Democratic candidate for senator, was honored at an open house Tuesday at the Roseburg Women's Club.

Mrs. Neuberger first ran for the state legislature in 1950, and was re-elected in 1952. Her husband has been a state senator from Multnomah county for some time. Perhaps her best-known legislative work was in influencing the passage of the bill to allow the sale of colored oleomargarine in Oregon. She has also been active in legislative matters pertaining to education, as well as many other matters.

The Neuberger family, who are well-known authors as well as legislators have as their hobby the "outdoors" of the Northwest. Recently they traveled over much of the original route taken by Lewis and Clark, and have written many articles on this subject.

In a book, "Ladies of Courage," published last week by G. P. Putnam and Son, by Eleanor Roosevelt and Lorena Hickok, they devote most of one chapter to Mrs. Neuberger's outstanding record as a public servant. They discuss now she decided to run for office when she and her husband were traveling on a writing trip along the Lewis and Clark trail in central Idaho. In this book, they say, "Long before she became a legislator, Maurine Neuberger, former teacher, was active in the American Association of University Women and the League of Women Voters. Mrs. Neuberger thinks that perhaps she gets elected because the women who are her enthusiastic supporters do not think she is a rabid partisan even though she is a Democrat."

In the recent 1954 primary election, she polled a total of 53,000 votes. No other legislative candidate for the House of Representatives or Democratic state received more than 42,000 votes in the same election.

Mrs. Neuberger is the daughter of a pioneer Oregon family from Tillamook county.

Mr. Neuberger, who was in Roseburg to speak at the Kiwanis luncheon and to attend a Democratic rally at the Junior High School attended the open house from 3:15 until 4:15 to autograph copies of his books.
