In a charming candlelight ceremony which took place at four o'clock Saturday, June 5, in the Methodist Church of Ashland, Miss Barbara Tayoko Kimura, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Satoru Kimura of Waipahu, Oahu, became the bride of John Eugene Carter II, son of Mr. and Mrs. Darrell Carter of Riddle.

Preceding the ceremony Mrs. Jeanne Salyer of Ashland sang "Because," and "I Love You Truly," accompanied at the piano by Miss Darrellene Lu Carter, sister of the bridegroom, who also played the pipe organ for incidental music and the Wagner's Wedding Processional and Mendelssohn's Recessional. The Rev. Ross Knotts, pastor of the church, performed the double ring ceremony before eighty friends and relatives.

The bride, given in marriage by her brother, Kenneth Kimura, a student at Southern Oregon college, was beautifully gowned in white lace and nylon net over slipper satin. The lace bodice had long pointed sleeves, pointed waistline and a scalloped boat shaped neckline. The overskirt of nylon net was trimmed with bands of lace insertion and tapered to a short train. Her lace edged net fingertip veil was held in place by a seed pearl tiara, and five white cattleya orchids with crown flower streamers formed the bridal noisette.

The couple spent their honeymoon at the Oregon coast. For going away the bride wore a navy blue suit with white accessories and a white orchid corsage. On Monday of this week Mr. Carter reported to the Oregon National Guard for summer training camp. He was graduated from Southern Oregon College on June 4, and will teach in the Oakridge Oregon Elementary school during the coming year. The bride will continue her studies through the University of Oregon extension course held at Oakridge. The young couple plan to live in Riddle until late August.
