

Mrs. Hartle Names Long List Of Communist Party Members At Seattle Probe

SEATTLE (AP) — In her fifth morning on the witness stand, Mrs. Barbara Hartle testified Friday that the Communist Party "made more headway" in the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) than in any other union in the Northwest.

She added, however, that by 1950 the Communists had suffered some "severe setbacks" in the union.

Testifying before the House Un-American Activities Committee, the former state Communist leader added:

"From the middle 1930's until I left the party in 1950, the Communist Party had considerable in-

fluence in the IWA, especially in District 2 (Northwest Washington.)"

She said, however, "there were some officers in the IWA who strongly resisted communism."

Mrs. Hartle said Karly Larsen was "the most important officer of the Communist party in the IWA."

She also named William Wallace of Bellingham and O. M. Orton as Communists in the union during her membership. She said she attended a national Communist Party convention with Orton in 1938. She described both Orton and Wallace as high IWA officers.

Larsen won acquittal at the 1953 Communist conspiracy trial here after his attorney contended he left the party in 1946. Mrs. Hartle testified earlier this week that she

had been "the most important new Larsen as a party member for several years after that."

When asked how recently Larsen Communist in the IWA," Mrs. Hartle said 1948.

Larsen watched a television screen in an ante-room as he waited to take the stand.

Mrs. Hartle added 134 names to the list of those she had known as party members. It raised the total above 300.

In another morning highlight, Eugene V.
