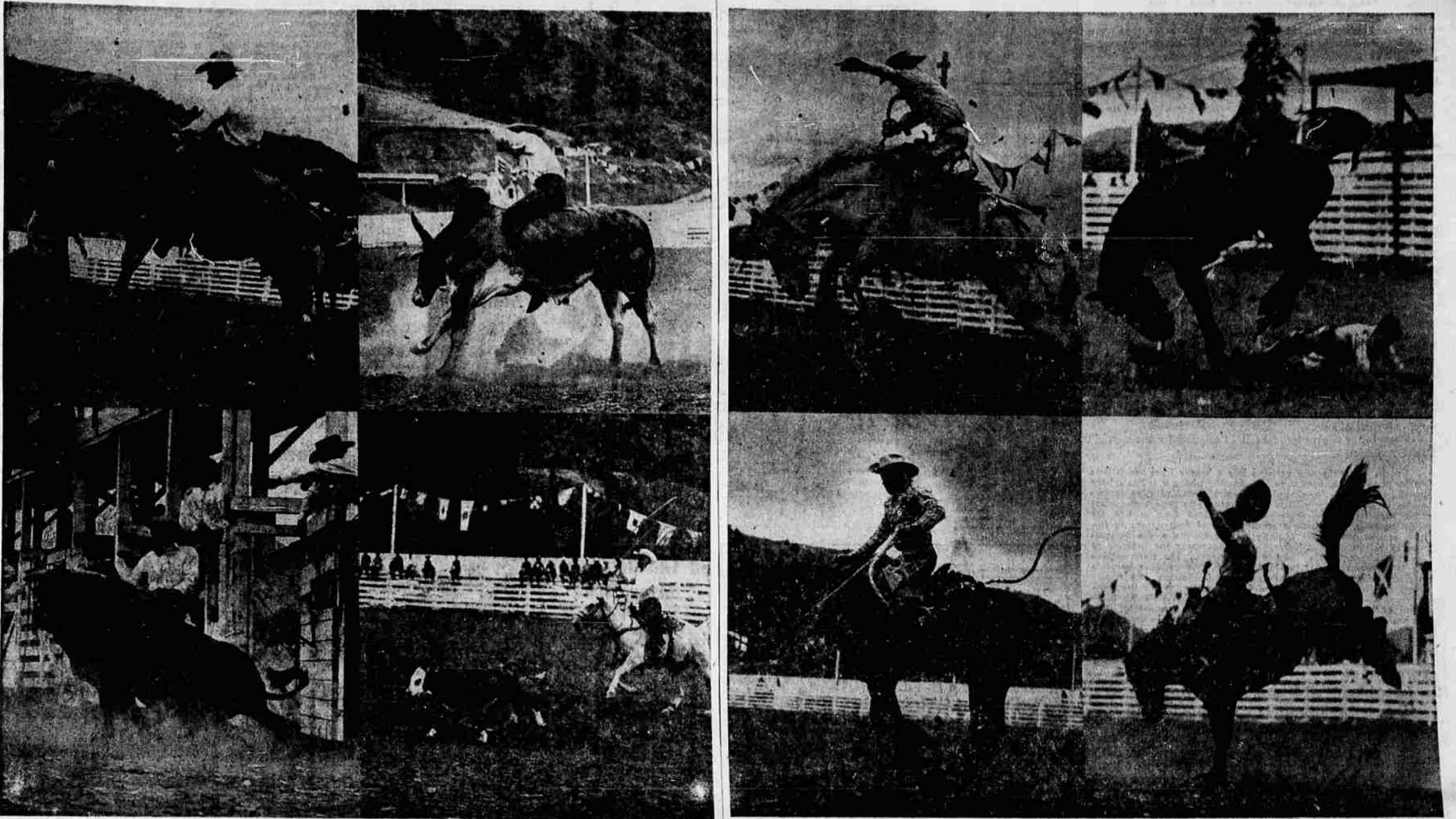


# Thrills, Plenty Of Spills And Pageantry Highlight Posse Rodeo Weekend

## CCC May Ask For Authority To Up Borrowing

**SPOKANE** — Congress will probably be asked this year to boost the Commodity Credit Corp.'s borrowing authority to 10 billion dollars for the farm price support program, Ross Ritzley, assistant secretary of agriculture, said Friday.

Ritzley said the government had about 6½ billion dollars tied up in price support operations before the harvesting of any of this year's crop. It was a record amount.

But despite this, he said, the Department of Agriculture had to ask Congress to increase the CCC's borrowing authority to 8½ billion so the program could be carried out this year.

"Now it looks very much as though we'll have to ask that be increased by another billion or more," he told reporters. "I think it's safe to speculate it will have to be raised to at least 10 billion."

Ritzley, here for a grain dealers' meeting, said the government's storage bill on crops taken over amounts to 720 million dollars every 24 hours, with the mountains of surplus commodities still growing.

"We are going into another harvest and we still have in CCC inventory or as security for CCC loans nearly a billion bushels of wheat, over three-fourths that much corn, about 8 million bales of cotton, and vast quantities of butter, cheese, oil, and other commodities."

"Before we turn a hand to harvest this year's crop we will have enough carryover wheat to meet this country's bread needs for nearly two years," he said.

Ritzley said the administration is "leaving no stone unturned" to find new markets, and has had trade missions in Europe, South America and Asia.

He said the government will probably have to extend its loan operations for barley, grain sorghums, flaxseed, soybeans, oats and rye which will be harvested from acres diverted from wheat, corn and cotton.

## Three Witnesses Refuse To Talk At Velde Hearing

**PORTLAND** — Three witnesses who wouldn't talk went before the Velde Committee here Saturday and two of them got the television cameras turned away before they took the stand.

Frank Patterson, identified as an ousted Communist Friday by a committee witness, Homer Leroy Owen of Arlington, Va., said he was a bookkeeper and a 1933 graduate of the Northwestern College of Law, the committee counsel, Robert Kunzig, asked why then he wasn't a member of the Oregon State Bar.

Patterson asked Kunzig if he would withdraw the question if he learned that Patterson's application was now under consideration by the Oregon Supreme Court and Kunzig said he would, and turned to other questions.

The other questions got no answers, though. Ten times Patterson refused answers on Communist Party membership and related matters. Then he was dismissed and Kunzig said he certainly hopes "the bar of this state will take the actions of this witness before the Supreme Court of this state."

Herbert Simpson, also listed in Friday testimony as a Communist Party member, similarly declined to talk and similarly asked that TV cameras be turned away. Under rules of the committee, the House Un-American Activities Committee, this must be done on a witness's request.

When Simpson made the request, the committee chairman, Rep. Velde (R-III) sought a promise from Simpson that once the cameras were turned away, he would answer questions. Simpson refused, the cameras were ordered turned aside, and Simpson declined to answer questions, pleading constitutional guarantees.

Another morning witness, Thomas G. Moore, similarly named Friday by Owen as a party member, also refused to answer questions.

## Ex-Airman Toth Takes Case To Supreme Court

**WASHINGTON** — Former airman Robert W. Toth has carried to the Supreme Court his fight against standing trial before an Air Force court-martial in connection with the 1952 slaying of a South Korean civilian.

Toth's lawyers yesterday asked the high court to overturn a U.S. Court of Appeals decision that he may be court-martialed. The attorneys said the Toth case goes into the question of "whether and to what extent . . . Congress can convert our democratic civil government into a military oligarchy."
