His brother, Nuh, a Roseburg High School star, rapped out a triple to add the cause.

Sutherland collected three hits and a walk in the opening frame to launch the attack; then moved into high with six runs in the second on four hits and a pair of walks.

This was enough to wrap up the game for the visitors. The big bits of the game were Beamer's triple, doubles by Bert Avery and Art Davidson and a homer to end Sutherland's scoring by Harvey Whitten in the ninth.

Beamer hurled a hitless ball through the first six innings before Terrell Huston broke the spell with a single in the seventh. Roseburg's only run came hopelessly in the ninth after Kenneth Forrest had walked. Archie Anderson brought him in with a single.

Tow-head Pat Wohlers made a shambles of Medford pitching Saturday night and Sunday afternoon to pace the Drain Black Sox to two more victories, 8-2, and 21-2.

The Saturday night Southern Oregon League tilt at Drain took on the proportions of a fair show, although the powerful Sox were solidly in control. But Sunday, the game was called by mutual consent at the end of the seventh run as the Sox had knocked the splinters off the fences.

Wohlers launched one of his greatest weekends in the first inning to bring in Bob Cellers with the first run. In the fourth inning, the Sox trounced home three more runs on doubles by Don Porter and Bobby Boub and singles by Cellers and Wohlers. These were enough to win the game. Wohlers had three singles and a triple for that night's work. The Linfield stud, Del Courso, kept the Cheney Sox on his hip with three hits. He struck out nine and walked five.

He took off his mask and shin guards to toss four-hit ball the rest of the way. He even struck out a man.

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
