4 More Mills Struck In County

Roseburg Lbr., Umpqua Still In Operation

Little Change Seen In Strike Over Northwest

At least four more mills in Douglas County were closed by strikes today, swelling the total to eight since woods and sawmill workers began leaving their jobs Monday morning.

Members of CIO Woodworkers Local 307 voted last night to strike at Associated Plywood sawmill and Douglas County Lumber Co. mill, both at Roseburg, and the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. operation at Sutherlin.

At the same time, the workers at the large turnout voted to continue work at Wilbur Lumber Co. and Stebbings Lumber Co. Jim Brown, assistant business manager of the local, said Wilbur Lumber Co. has made a "substantial offer" in wage negotiations. The CIO plants employ a total of about 500.

Also out are CIO employees in the broom handle division of St. Helena Woods Products Co. Other plant workers, members of AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers Local 2949, struck Monday morning.

Joining the list of AFL plants struck was the big E. K. Wood mill south of Roseburg. Monday morning, Western Battery Separator, Commercial Lumber Sales and Youngs Bay Lumber Co. (under Local 2671) also shut down.

Joelson Lumber Co., Roseburg, is not operating its mill, but there has been no strike by AFL workers. Negotiations are continuing.

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Des Moines Set For Huge Flood

DES MOINES (AP) — Iowa's capital city braced itself Tuesday for the greatest Des Moines River flood in history.

Efforts of city workers were centered on a new levee system which protects much of the central area of the city north of the downtown business district.

The river is expected to rise late Wednesday to a crest one to two feet higher than the June, 1947, flood which broke through levees and flooded a wide area.

The stream cuts through the heart of Des Moines.

With a forecast of fair weather as the main cheerful note, the crisis eased at Sioux City, Mason City and Fort Dodge. But the Boone and Webster city areas were battling all-time flood stages.

County Schools Reverse Roseburg Trend; Seven Pass School Budgets Monday

The trend in school voting noted in Roseburg was reversed as all but one major district in the county having a budget up for approval at the annual school elections Monday.

The Roseburg budget was beaten down (see col. 8), but at least seven other school districts okayed amounts outside the 6 per cent limitation. Other districts already had voted on their budgets, and they were not an issue Monday.

At Oakland, a \$136,141.76 amount outside the limitation was defeated, 148-74. Lytle Himelwright won 135 votes in his election to a three-year directorship on the school board. His opponent was Floyd Ross.

New directors were elected in every district, with the exception of union high school districts in Reedsport, Drain and Yoncalla. Voters in those areas will vote next Monday on budgets and school board members.

Though the budgets passed, several had tight squeezes.

A tax levy of \$103,180.88 outside the limitation in Myrtle Creek carried by a vote of 248-217. Total budget is \$612,342.28. Vincent Knox polled 218 votes to win a five-year term on the school board. He beat John Meier and Delvis Williams. Winner of a three-year term is Gilbert Weaver, who had 220 votes to defeat Jack Doud and Mrs. Roy Denman.

Riddle voters carried a \$49,003 levy outside the limitation by a count of 134-116. James F. Carroll, a write-in candidate, won a three-year school board term, polling 126 votes for his victory over Archie Louisgiant and Elmer Mitchell.

Other voters were more popular, though. Elktion cast a unanimous

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Guatemalan Delegates Say Invaders Being Driven Back

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — (AP) The Guatemalan delegation to the U.N. reported Tuesday government forces are driving back the invaders on all sections of the fighting in Guatemala. But the delegation said aggression against Guatemala continues and asked the Security Council to take further measures against it.

Ambassador Eduardo Castillo - Arriola announced through a spokesman that nothing had been done by the aggressors to comply with the Security Council resolution approved Sunday requesting an end to the bloodshed in Guatemala.

The ambassador reported his government had sent a cable late Monday to the U. N. informing the Security Council that "aggression" was continuing and asking the council to do something about it. The delegation did not request another meeting of the council at this stage.

In Washington, it was disclosed that Guatemala had withdrawn completely her complaint of "foreign aggression" lodged with the Inter-American Peace Commission. Apparently this was done

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First Session Winding Up At Boy Scout Camp

Two Douglas Fir District Boy Scout troops will be winding up their week in Camp Tiltcoos Saturday when the camp located on Siltcoos Lake north of Reedsport, is dedicated.

The brand-new camp, built this spring for Oregon Trail Council Scout activities, was put to first use this week. Local troops there are the American Legion's 7 and Fullerton School's 114, both of Roseburg.

Gov. Paul Patterson, long identified in scout activities, has been invited to the dedication. Scout activities will begin in the morning, with formal dedication set in the afternoon. It was not certain that the governor can attend, according to Walt Smith, district field executive.

The camp, said Smith, will run for seven weeks this summer instead of the six originally scheduled. A troop of scouts may spend one week at the camp during the period it is open. Smith said that all seven weeks are reserved.

The public is invited to attend the proceedings, Smith said.

600,000 Feet of Timber Sold To Sun Studs Inc.

Six hundred thousand feet of timber was sold by the U.S. Forest Service Monday afternoon to Sun Studs Inc., Roseburg, at the appraised price of \$12,597.50, according to Lou Gabel of the local office.

The timber is about 20 miles east of Myrtle Creek. Sun Studs bid the appraised price and was the only bidder.

The special prices were \$19.30 per thousand for Douglas fir, \$36.15 for sugar pine and \$5.95 for hemlock and other species.

40 Persons Turn Out To Consider Budget

About 40 people turned out at the Douglas County Courthouse Monday to raise objections or suggestions for consideration by the county court in next year's operating budget.

No serious objections were voiced, so now the budget only awaits some minor changes and final approval by the court. No vote was necessary on the budget this year since there was no amount needed to be raised by taxation outside the 6 per cent limitation.

Army Private Pays \$150 Fine On Liquor Count

Roger Gordon Eakle, a 19-year-old U. S. Army private, was fined \$150 Monday in district court after pleading guilty to being illegally in possession of alcoholic liquor, reports Judge Elmer Baldwin.

He was booked twice in the Douglas County jail on similar charges. He was arrested Sunday and released on \$100 bail on an old warrant for a similar charge. He was arrested again Monday by a deputy sheriff on the newer charge. Judge Baldwin dropped the older charge.

Also arrested on an illegal possession charge was a 17-year-old Seattle boy. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 and released.

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Senate-House Recommend \$36 Million For The Dalles

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate-House conference committee recommended appropriating \$6 million dollars for construction work on the Dalles Dam in the year beginning July 1 Monday. The conferees agreed on 27 million dollars for Chief Joseph Dam.

Both figures are below appropriations previously approved by the Senate. They still must be accepted by members of each chamber.

The appropriation for the Dalles is 2 million under the Senate figure but 7 million over the total approved in the House. The 27 million dollars for Chief Joseph is the figure approved by the House but is 3 million under the total okayed by the Senate.

Conferees said the recommended appropriations will keep work on schedule at the two Columbia River dams.

In other actions, the committee reduced funds for a Lower Columbia fish sanctuary from \$1,360,000 to 1 million, eliminated \$500,000 approved by the Senate for planning John Day Dam on the Columbia, and accepted the Senate figure of \$3,800,000 for Albeni Falls Dam in Idaho.

Voters in the Roseburg School District balked Monday for the second time in little more than a month as they again turned down a proposed tax levy outside the 6 per cent limitation.

The budget for the school year 1954-55 was defeated May 18 by 725 votes. The margin was closer this time. The count stood at 865 for and 1,104 against—a difference of 239 votes.

The result meant defeat for the school budget committee's recommendation for a levy of \$953.15 outside the limitation to balance the budget.

Carried down with the budget was a one-year serial levy of \$24,000 which would have been used to purchase a school site on Brookside Lane. The margin was greater on this issue—649 for and 1,288 against.

Three new school directors were elected in the balloting. Wayne Crooch, an incumbent appointee, won a five-year term. He received 1,603 votes, but was unopposed.

A second appointee member of the board was defeated in his try for a three-year term. Earl Kelley came in third behind Robert Bashford and Ralph Turner. Bashford polled 761 ballots. Turner 408 and Kelley 404. A fourth candidate for the post, Warren Engdahl, trailed with 100 votes.

Funeral services for Karen Ann Arkell, 16, who died Sunday of injuries received in an automobile accident June 16, will be held in the Episcopal Church at Redding, Calif., Wednesday at 2 p.m.

Miss Arkell was the only daughter of Mrs. Marion (Iris) Spitz, who was seriously injured in the accident and is still in Mercy Hospital at Redding. Mrs. Spitz is fourth grade teacher at Fullerton School, Roseburg. Karen would have been a junior at Roseburg high school next year. She was very active in school events.

The girl and her mother were on their way to Redding for the summer when the mishap occurred. Mrs. Spitz reportedly swerved off the highway about 20 miles north of Redding to avoid hitting a car which was in the wrong lane of traffic.

Karen's father was killed in World War II. Survivors, besides her mother and stepfather, include two brothers, Ray Marshall of McMinnville and Culver Marshall of Burns.
