WASHINGTON (AP)—Under Secretary of State Walter Bedell Smith was quoted as telling a White House conference of congressional leaders Wednesday that most of Indochina probably will remain free from Communist control. "They still expect Laos, Cambodia and part of Vietnam to resist Communism," a veteran senator, who asked that his name not be used, said in an interview.

The senator was one of 30 key Congress members, both Republicans and Democrats, who were invited by President Eisenhower to hear a report by Smith on the stalemate conference with the Communists at Geneva on Korea and Indochina.

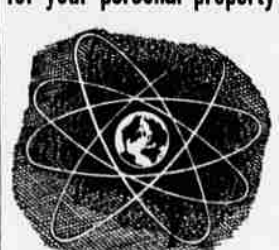

Posted Highway Speed Signs Get Committee Okay

PORTLAND (AP)—A proposal that speed limits be posted on the state's highways — varying from place to place based on local conditions — was approved by a subcommittee of the Oregon Highway Lifesavers Tuesday.

The proposal, made on a motion by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, retains the principle of Oregon's "basic rule" that top speeds shall be whatever is safe for the conditions at the time. It does this by suggesting if posted speed be exceeded, the motorist be required to prove it safe at the time, and if police arrest a motorist when going less than the posted speed, police be required to prove that the posted speed would not be safe under the conditions at the time.

This chief point, brought out by Robert C. Nolson, Oregonian managing editor who made the suggestion on which Baldock's motion was based, was that the posted signs would take the place of the opinions of motorists and police as to what speed is reasonable and safe under normal conditions. The posted speeds would be based on a survey to be made by the state speed Control Board or the Highway Commission. The sub-committee proposal will go to the full group with a recommendation it be submitted to the legislature.
