

Sutherlin Girl Shoots 85 Score In Qualifying Round At Medford

MEDFORD — The opening round of men's match play got underway here Wednesday in the 26th annual Oregon Golf Assn. championships.

Qualifying rounds were completed Tuesday with ties posted in both the men's and women's divisions. Dr. Bruce Stanley of Medford and Tal Smith, former California open champ from Alameda, were knotted for the medal in the 36-hole men's round. Both had cards of 73-71-144 after Monday and Tuesday play on the par 72 Rogue Valley course.

Mrs. Harry Stepp and Barbara Snook, both of Portland, carded 4-over-par 80 in the women's 18-hole qualifier.

Sixty-four men were to compete in Wednesday's round. The field of 16 women was to open match play Thursday.

Ralph Dichter, Astoria, and George Harrington, Medford, were one stroke behind the men's leaders with 145s. Eddie Simmonds, Medford, who led Monday's round, and Harry Terrell Jr., Grants Pass, carded 146. Terrell had rounds of 75 and 71.

Dick Bailey of Redding, Calif., had 147 and Don Provost Jr., Medford, 148.

Tied at 149 were Bob Norquist and Bob McReynolds, Portland. Don Leal, Eugene, Leal's rounds were 74-75.

In the women's round Mrs. W. W.

Davies, Medford, trailed the leaders with 82. Then came Sue DeVoe, 2nd Mrs. Maxine Hammond, both of Medford, with 84s. Mrs. Lloyd Burgess, Astoria, and Carol Joe Kabler, the latter the state junior champion from Sutherlin, carded 85s.

Mrs. Francis Rowell, the defending champion, was not required to qualify. She shot 83 in a practice round.

It took a score of 91 or better to qualify in the women's division. It took 105 or better to qualify in the men's division.

Is That So!

MOST LAND MAMMALS can swim or at least keep up to the surface of water. This includes mice, skunks, and hamsters—although the latter slips one over by bowing up his cheek pouches before entering the water. Going these one better, the American star-nosed mole has been seen swimming across a small pond beneath the ice.

Among land animals which submerge, there are several which walk from bank to bank on the bottom of streams instead of swimming. For example, the stream bed is fairly narrow, a nine-banded armadillo will cross by walking all the way on the bottom, but should the river appear too wide, he will dog paddle to the top, gulp in a big breath, puff himself up like a balloon, and buoyed by this internal life preserver, cross the widest river despite his coat of armor. The tapir does better; he'll walk clear across the bottom of fairly wide rivers.

ONE of the heaviest, the hippopotamus, and one of the lightest, the water shrew, have acquired the knack of keeping submerged at will and feeding on the bottom of streams and then coming to the top when they feel like it.

But as far as I know, none of these land-based creatures has been clocked under the water for more than 8 minutes. In contrast, the truly aquatic mammals can stay under much longer. For them, these maximum records have been established:

Fur-bearing seal, 15 minutes; Florida manatee, 16; fin whale, 30; blue whale, 49; sperm whale, 75; Greenland right whale, 80; and the champion recorded to date, the bottlenose whale, 120 minutes!

How these warm-blooded, air-breathing, suckling mammals can endure such prolonged underwater periods without renewing their oxygen supply has always been a mystery—and it is only within the past 10 years that we have begun to work out part of the answer.

IT WAS presumed that these water dwellers had a much larger lung for storing oxygen—but this did not square with the facts once they were known. When measured, it was found that the relative lung capacity of the human is just as great as that of the seal and the manatee; just a little less than that of the porpoise, but double that of the whale who can stay submerged for two hours!

The first clue came when we found that diving animals can renew the air contained in their lungs much more completely than do land mammals: where man renews, say, from 15 to 20 per cent with each exhalation, the large whale gets a 90 per cent turnover!

The second clue came when it was found that in land mammals the presence of carbon dioxide—the waste matter in breathing—stimulates the breathing center of the nervous system while in these diving mammals, the increase of the amount of carbon dioxide in the blood has little if any such effect.

WHEN we put these two factors together, we have a good part

of the answer, it means that the aquatic mammal starts its dive with a larger dose of oxygen and that its breathing apparatus is not stepped up with the accumulation of carbon dioxide!

Finally, it was found that aquatic mammals use their oxygen supply sparingly. In fact, as soon as the dive is begun, the heart slows down considerably.

In the bottlenose dolphin, it slows down 50 per cent; in the gray seal, the count falls from 100 a minute to 10. And in the common seal, oxygen consumption during the first minute of the dive falls to 25 per cent of what it is when the animal is in repose—not in action!

Despite this falling off of circulation in the submerged aquatic mammal, a very wonderful thing happens: By some special arrangement about which we still know nothing, less blood—which means less oxygen—is supplied to most of the body, thus conserving the oxygen; but the same amount continues to be supplied to the brain—to take care of the essential vital activities concerned with evading foes or capturing prey! Thus, the submerged mammal can continue to function most intelligently. Makes sense, doesn't it?

Jay Dean, George Shaw Named On All-American Baseball '9s'

EAST LANSING, Mich. — The sixth annual All-American college baseball team, announced Wednesday by the American Assn. of College Baseball Coaches, would be a dream team for some professional managers.

The aggregation, announced by association Pres. John H. Kobs, Michigan State College baseball coach, boasts a .383 combined batting average.

They were led at the plate by the 486 mark of Baylor's right fielder Mickey Sullivan, one of two repeaters on the first team. Only other first team holdover from the 1953 squad is Richard Murphy, Ohio University outfielder who recently signed with the Cincinnati Reds.

Top home run hitter with six is Jerry Schoonmaker, left fielder for the 1954 NCAA champions of the University of Missouri. Warren Goodrich, Stanford shortstop, had five triples to lead in that column, while Oregon State's Jay Dean, first, had nine doubles.

Other Westerners selected by the coaches were Ed Anderson of Montana, named catcher on the second team, and George Shaw of Oregon, third team centerfielder.
