YONCALLA NYF ELECTS OFFICERS

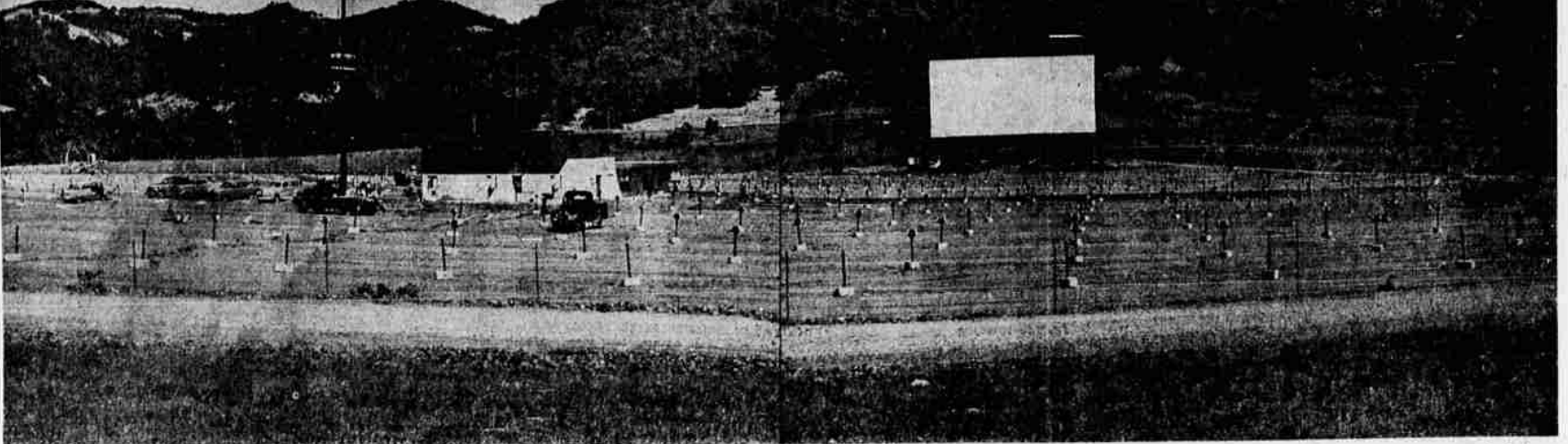
