Russian Chess Players Need One Point To Win

NEW YORK (AP)—Russia's chess team needs a single point to lock up their victory as their tournament with America's best players goes into its fourth and last round.

The Russian team led 15 1/2 points to 7 1/2 as all but one of the third-round games were completed Tuesday.

A verbal tempest over whether America's No. 1 player, Samuel Reshevsky, was the victim of a "long count" in his third game with Vassily Smyslov was resolved when Reshevsky fought to a draw.

Reshevsky had charged that Smyslov's time clock failed to work right, giving the Russian an extra 35 minutes to complete the required 40 moves in the Monday night session. Reshevsky, pressed for time, had to play feverishly to get under the wire.

Myrtle Creek Official Census Is Now 2,436

Myrtle Creek City Recorder G. D. Myltenbeck said today that the new official census of the city of Myrtle Creek is 2,436 persons, an increase of 655 since the 1950 census.

He noted that this total would bring in an additional revenue of \$1,729.10 to the city, an increase of \$7.22 per person. Myltenbeck said the census figures have been broken down into precincts for the first time, and reports 649 persons in Precinct 1; 842 in Precinct 2, and 945 in Precinct 3.

West Coast Airlines Wins Safety Award

The annual safety award goes only to domestic, territorial and overseas airlines which fly scheduled passenger runs.

Settlement Reported At Pendleton Mills

PENDLETON (AP)—Settlement of a union-shop issue at two mills idled a week ago was announced Wednesday by management and union officials, and between 300 and 400 workers will return to work Thursday morning.

Disputants, however, declined to disclose terms of the agreement, involving the Pilot Rock Lumber Co. and the Kerns Company of Oregon, Ltd., of Pilot Rock.

Al Moltke, vice president of Pilot Rock Lumber Co., and D. A. Welby, of Baker, international representative union, said they had agreed not to announce the terms.

Only issue in the brief strike was whether the workers here would be granted a union-shop provision in their contract with the two companies. The dispute was not related to the widespread walkout in the lumber industry over wage demands.

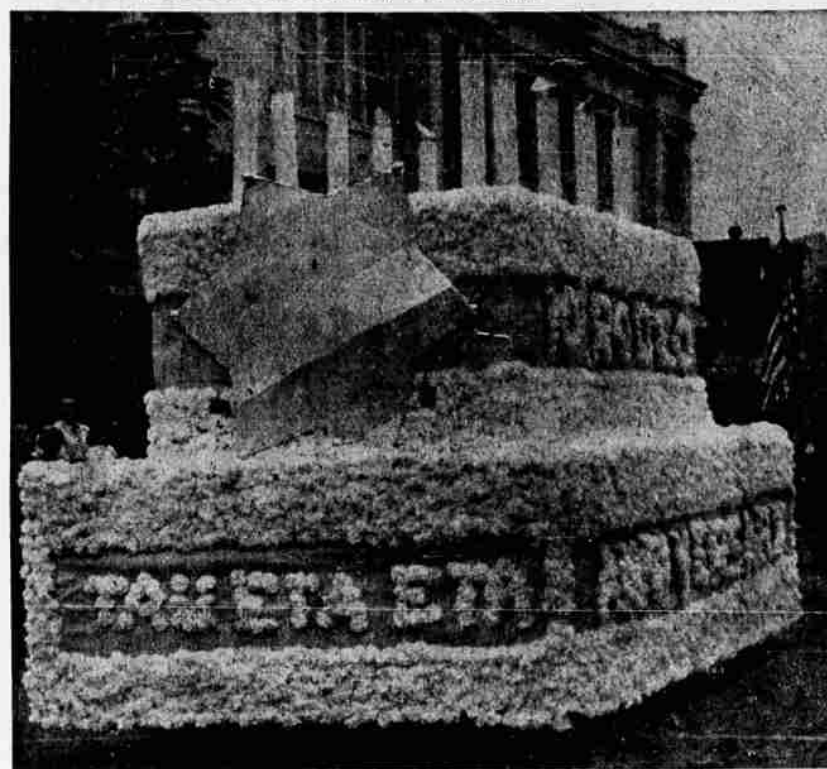
SETS CONFERENCES
