

Education Help Offered Vets Of Two Wars

World War II and Korean veterans planning to use State of Oregon educational benefits to attend summer school should apply immediately, the state Department of Veterans' Affairs announces.

Raymond E. Pettey, educational officer for the state veterans' department, said students may apply at their schools, through county service officers, or directly to the department in the State Library building, Salem, or State Office building, Portland.

Oregon pays a benefit of \$50 per month to eligible veterans attending full time undergraduate college courses, or \$35 for other approved courses requiring at least 40 classroom hours of attendance monthly. Courses of less than 40 hours a month, such as night school classes, warrant payments at the rate of \$14 cents per hour.

No benefit is payable for correspondence or hobby courses, nor during a period in which the student is receiving allowances under the federal GI bill.

To qualify, a veteran must have been an Oregon resident for at least one year immediately prior to his World War II or Korean service, and he must have served at least six months and be honorably discharged. The Korean veteran must have earned the Korean service medal.

Benefits are payable for as many months as the veteran spent on active duty during the war periods, to a maximum of 36 months. There is no deadline for applying.

French Patrols Beat Off Ambush By Guerrillas

HANOI, Indochina (AP) — French patrols beat off an ambush by 200 Vietnamese guerrillas 60 miles south of Hanoi early Wednesday, killing 30 of the Communist-led rebels.

The action occurred near Ninh Binh. The French said tanks and artillery caught the attackers in their concentrated fire as the Vietnamese fled the ambush site.

The French claimed 57 other rebels killed and 47 captured in small clashes throughout the Red River delta during the 24-hour period ending Wednesday morning.

The French also kept up their systematic bombing of guerrilla bases along the supply lifeline from the sea.

Liquor Commission Get Bids On New Warehouse

PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon Liquor Control Commission reported Tuesday that the total of low bids for construction of the commission's new warehouse at Milwaukie was \$1,105,879.

The low bids, all from Portland concerns: C. M. Corkum Co., \$841,887; general contract; Heuser Electric Co., \$12,000; electric work; A. G. Rushlight and Co., \$191,982; plumbing and heating.

The commission said it will ask the State Emergency Board for additional funds for the project since its available money is slightly less than the bid total.

New Blue Book Requirement Up For Board Action

SALEM (AP) — Whether the secretary of state's office will be required to publish a second Oregon Blue Book this biennium will be settled Friday when the State Emergency Board receives a request for \$12,000 to pay for it.

The last Legislature passed a bill sponsored by Reps. Monroe Sweetland of Milwaukie and David Baum of La Grande, providing that the Blue Book, the state's official reference guide, be published as the Legislature convenes instead of after it has adjourned. The book always has been over a year old when the Legislature meets in January and has not contained the names of federal, state, county and city officials elected the previous November.

The law making the change went into effect this year, so the secretary of state's office was required to produce a book after the Legislature met in 1953. It was not distributed until January of this year. Now, under the new law, another one is required before the Legislature meets next January. However, the Legislature provided only enough funds to produce one Blue Book and \$12,000 would be needed to publish the second one.

William Healy, assistant secretary of state, who is responsible for the book, is expected to protest the production of the second one, pointing out the difficulty of assembling and printing the necessary information in the interval between the November election and the opening of the Legislature.

Rep. Baum, sponsor of the plan, is a member of the Emergency Board.

A possible compromise is the issuance of a supplementary leaflet containing the names of newly elected officials.

FPC Criticized By Public Power Attorney Cooper

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal Power Commission engineers were criticized Wednesday for "failing" to make power market studies of the Hells Canyon area in comparing dam-building plans.

Evelyn Cooper, attorney for groups advocating the federal Hells Canyon dam in the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon said it was "inconceivable" that the FPC engineers would not make a market study.

She said this during cross-examination of Lester Wing, regional FPC engineer from San Francisco, at a hearing on Idaho Power Co. applications to build three dams in the Hells Canyon area.

Wing said the engineers assumed there would be a demand for power from any dam in the area so market studies were not necessary in comparing power production costs for alternate project plans.

Such studies, he added, would not affect the results of the FPC engineers' comparison, which purports to show the three proposed dams would be more economically feasible than the federal project.

Mrs. Cooper is expected to complete her five-day cross-examination of Wing late Wednesday. Idaho Power then will begin presenting rebuttal witnesses.

Tobacco Institute Says More Study Is Needed

NEW YORK (AP) — Further study and experiments are necessary, the tobacco industry says, to pin down the causes of cancer and heart disease.

It views as "preliminary" an American Cancer Society report indicating cigarette smoking cuts the life span.

The tobacco industry's attitude was made public Tuesday in a statement issued through Dr. Clarence Cook Little, newly appointed director for a scientific committee set up to study the effects of tobacco on health.

Dr. Little termed "of vital interest" the findings of the scientists who made the study for the American Cancer Society but took the position that more proof is needed.

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
