Each pupil played for the adjudicator, Mrs. Amy Lee Arney. The requirements were four pieces, two of which had to be memorized, one by Bach, one technique piece, one by a classic or romantic composer and one modern. Each student was also tested as to his knowledge of major and minor scales, chords and theory. Three pupils received the grade of passing with distinction, and seven received passing with honorable mention.
