

Agriculture Department Funds Bill Goes To Ike

WASHINGTON — Congress sent to President Eisenhower Wednesday a bill appropriating \$723,683,150 in new cash to the Agriculture Department for the fiscal year starting July 1.

In addition to the cash, the bill contains loan authority of more than 300 million dollars, of which 135 million is for the Rural Electrification Administration.

The bill is a compromise of measures passed previously by the Senate and the House. Its cash total is 25 million more than President Eisenhower had requested.

Congressional action was completed when the Senate and House approved the compromise by voice vote without debate.

Cohn Takes Stand In Court Case

NEW YORK — Roy M. Cohn made another witness stand appearance Wednesday—this time in connection with a narcotics case he prosecuted when he was assistant U. S. attorney here.

The chief counsel of the Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee, recently a witness in the Hevesi Army-McCarthy hearings, testified in federal court.

The case involved Eugene Tramaglino, serving a 10-year term in Atlanta Penitentiary on a narcotics charge and now seeking a writ of habeas corpus.

Cohn testified under questioning by Tramaglino's lawyer, Ralph J. Barr, he had "absolutely no knowledge of the hearing of any witnesses and no knowledge of subornation of perjury."

Tramaglino claimed through counsel that Cohn knew about the hearings and suppressed that and other evidence during the 1951 trial—accusations that Cohn denied.

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Department Doesn't Want Engineering Job

PORTLAND — A proposal that the State Highway Department handle engineering and construction of the new Morrison Street Bridge in Portland was opposed Tuesday by the Oregon Technical Council.

Thomas Smithson, a director of the council which is an organization of professional engineers and architects, said there was doubt that the highway department was sufficiently staffed to handle the project.

Such work should go to private engineering firms, he added.

County Roadmaster George Buck, who made the proposal, said engineering by the state would save \$160,000.

Peiping Radio Asserts 10 Planes Shot Down

TOKYO — Peiping Radio asserted Wednesday Chinese Communist defense forces shot down 10 Nationalist fighter planes and damaged 4 others which raided the Chekiang Province coast about midway between Formosa and Shanghai in May and early June.

The broadcast also said five Nationalist warships were damaged in the same period.

The Nationalists have claimed 7 Red gunboats and other small warcraft were sunk and 19 damaged and 2 MIG jets damaged in a series of sea and air clashes off Chekiang during that time. They have conceded no losses either to planes or warships.

The Nationalists said they launched the attacks to upset any Communist plans to invade the Tachen Islands.

Lack Of Funds May Keep Milk Bill Off Ballot

PORTLAND — A proposal to repeal the state milk control law may not get on the November ballot because of a lack of funds, Elmer Deitz, Canby dairyman, said Wednesday.

Deetz, one of the sponsors of the proposal, said 40,000 signatures had been obtained on the initiative petitions, but only 23,000 have been validated. He said it would cost about \$1,500 to have another 14,600 validated. That many more are needed to get the measure on the ballot.

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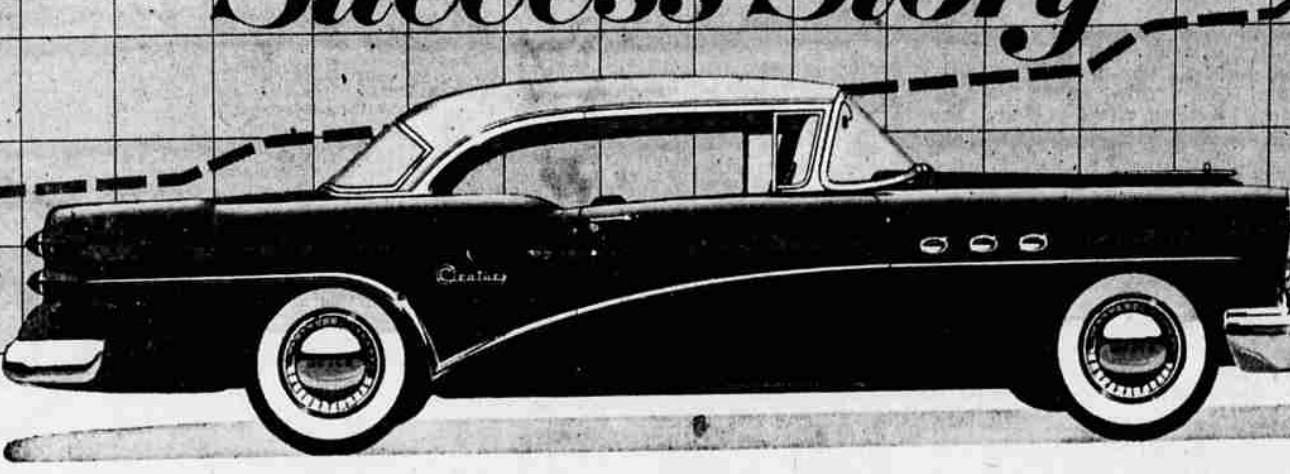
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
