Project Report Wins Approval Of Committee

SPOKANE (AP) — An engineer's report recommending construction of 36 hydroelectric projects in the area in the next 10 years won unanimous approval of the Pacific Northwest Governors' Power Policy Committee Wednesday.

The report, prepared by a committee headed by W. Jack Mosley, Portland, said that many dams will be needed to meet the region's power needs through 1964. The report warned, however, fishing interests may be expected to oppose 15 of the projects, which the engineers said would produce 55 per cent of the additional power.

Mosley told the committee fishing interests oppose projects on the Cowlitz, Deschutes and Baker Rivers and license requirements are holding up projects on the Snake.

The report proposed federal expenditures averaging 170 million dollars a year on federal and partnership projects. It said the fiscal year 1950 - 50 would require the maximum federal expenditure of 240 million dollars.

Non-federal utilities would finance, wholly or in part, 25 of the 36 projects, the report said. Six of the 25 would be partnership projects.
