

GUATEMALAN PRESIDENT ARBENZ RESIGNS

Former Soviet Police Head Bares Ruse That Squelched Demands For Independence

MUNICH, Germany (AP) — A former Russian secret police commander told in chilling detail Monday how he helped betray and deport a million of Stalin's subjects because they wanted independence from the Kremlin.

Lt. Col. Grigori Stepanovich Burlitski, 36, emerged into the glare of television floodlights to tell of racial murder in the Soviet Union. He has been hidden in the West for a year by U.S. intelligence agents. He deserted to the West last June but it was kept secret until he testified Monday before a U.S. congressional committee on Communist aggression, now in session here.

As the tiny, blue-eyed Cossack left the crowded committee room for the lunch recess, Chairman Charles J. Keenan (R-Wis.) told everyone to remain seated for one minute. This was to allow guards to whisk Burlitski safely away.

Speaking through an interpreter, Burlitski described how rebellious non-Russian peoples like the Chechens, Ingush, Dagestanis and others in the Caucasus and the Tatars of the Crimea were trapped by Soviet security forces in merciless "Trojan Horse" operations.

He told how a million people were fooled into believing Soviet Russian overtures of friendship so that they dropped their guard. Then they found themselves herded into cattle cars for deportation to the wastes of Siberia under the guns of men they had been entertaining as guests.

Burlitski said the Kremlin could not tolerate any independence movements so simply wiped out whole regions, leaving the land silent and deserted until new settlers could be found.

Burlitski said the Kremlin during World War II wiped out the tiny autonomous state of Chechen-Ingush in the Caucasus. Its 500,000 inhabitants — loving people were deported "to distant and unknown parts of the Soviet Union," he said.

He said the people were rounded up Sept. 23, 1944, under the ruse of a festival celebrating Red army victories.

Myrtle Creek Worker, Soldier Killed In Crash

A Myrtle Creek plywood worker and a hitch-hiking soldier were killed outright Saturday evening when their car smashed and headed into a Greyhound bus on Highway 99 near Castella, about 40 miles north of Redding, Calif.

Dead are Robert Charles Sibeck, 25, resident of Myrtle Creek for the past three years, and Lee James Flanagan, 19, a soldier from Yuba City, Calif.

Sibeck left Myrtle Creek Saturday to join his wife, Virginia, who was visiting relatives at Sacramento. Enroute he reportedly picked up Flanagan, hitch-hiking from Fort Lewis, Wash., to Yuba City.

According to the reports given friends at Myrtle Creek, Sibeck was asleep at the time of the accident, having turned the car over to his young companion.

Bus Driver Richard Burdick, Eugene, Ore., told police the car was in the wrong lane and swerved just before crashing head-on into the bus. Occupants of the bus were uninjured.

The body of Sibeck is to be returned to Myrtle Creek by Ganz Mortuary and services are tentatively planned for 2 p.m. Saturday.

Action Slated Independent Of Indochina

Sovereignty Of West Germany OK'd As Prod To Dilatory France

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Churchill declared Monday they will "press forward with plans for collective defense" of Southeast Asia, regardless of whether peace negotiations for Indochina are successful.

In a communique, they also expressed "conviction that further delay in the creation of a European Defense Community and granting of sovereignty to West Germany would damage the solidarity of the Atlantic nations."

This was a prod for France to get on with ratification of EDC. The American and British leaders jointly declared that "both our countries would benefit" from "technical cooperation" on atomic energy to the fullest extent permitted by United States law.

The communique, issued at the White House, was the first formal statement out of the four-day round of talks here on British-American policy differences.

The communique left unanswered the critical question of when an international conference to create a Southeast Asia anti-Communist alliance might be called.

U.S. Demands Haste

This has been a major issue, with Britain wanting no such definite action pending a conclusion of present French efforts to negotiate peace in Indochina. The United States, on the other hand, desired quick action. The communique appeared to bear out reports on continued disagreement by failure to report any agreement.

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Freightways Occupies New \$65,000 Agency

Consolidated Freightways opened for business Monday in its new \$65,000 terminal and warehouse on Airport Road, according to Art Benson, Roseburg manager for the motor freight company.

For 20 years, the company agency has been at 221 Spruce St., moving there from the Pacific Fruit & Produce building in 1934.

The new property gives ample blacktop parking area for the company's locally-based pickup trucks and over-the-road equipment, Benson said, with a large freight-handling area designed to accommodate 16 trucks or trailers at one time. Loading doors are located on each side.

A 3,650 square-foot warehouse section will provide protected storage for commercial and household goods.

Consolidated regularly employs a staff of 40 in Roseburg. It has provided daily, scheduled service to this area since 1930, when it purchased the operating authority of Associated Truck Line from C. M. O'Malley.

Benson is a six-year employee, having started as a leader at the company's Portland terminal. He was promoted to sales representative, then dock foreman at Coos Bay, manager at Grants Pass in 1949, and finally manager here in 1952.

Benson welcomes visitors to the new terminal. He will be glad to show them through the modern building at any time, he added.

Victory Looms For Tax Program Of Eisenhower

WASHINGTON (AP) — A three-way split among Senate Democrats over the big tax revision bill appeared likely today to give President Eisenhower a clear-cut victory on the measure — one of the biggest items on his 1954 program.

The House has okayed the bill, which would not change major taxes, but would cut taxes receipts \$1,400,000,000 in its first year of operation.

What shape the measure takes is expected to have a bearing on another bill soon to be asked for Congress: a proposal to raise the 275-billion-dollar national debt ceiling.

Paper Plants Now Hit; Court Action Enjoins Picketing Of Trains

CIO Woodworkers and AFL lumber and sawmill workers remained off the job at major Pacific Northwest timber operations Monday and union and management spokesmen said the prospect of early settlement of the walkout, now in its ninth day, was dim.

Several small mills in Montana settled over the weekend, the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, an employers group, reported, but there was no indication larger companies in five Western states planned a similar step.

The woodworkers have said they would consider any offer above 5 cents an hour. Some scattered settlements reported ranged from 12 1/2 cents down to no increase.

Meanwhile, the strike spread to the allied paper pulp industry. Striking AFL and CIO lumber workers set up picket lines at several major Western Washington pulp and paper plants Saturday night, but members of the AFL Pulp and Sulphite Union on orders of international president John Sherman were reported continuing on the job.

Plants being picketed were at Everett, Bellingham, Anacortes, Aberdeen and Shelton.

Train Pickets Enjoined

The unions set up picket lines at the Crown Zellerbach plant at Port Angeles Saturday night but withdrew them Sunday after the company notified the union its contract forbids picketing unless authorized.

Hurdle For School Budget

Tax Limitation Barrier Can Be Surmounted Only By People At Ballot Box

(First in a series on the school problem: The mill and the 6 per cent tax-limitation.)

The mill possibly is the little bug that has caused Roseburg's "turn-down-the-budget" fever four times (twice in the schools, twice in the city) in the past seven weeks. It's a figure of speech which not everyone understands, but which many are against.

The mill is a relative term. It's the device used to figure property tax in a district of assessed valuation.

It will raise \$1 in taxes for every \$1,000 in assessed valuation. In the Roseburg School District, assessed at approximately \$23 million, each mill will raise about \$23,000 for school purposes.

School Population Growth Stressed As Budget Basis

The Roseburg school district administration was today ready to explain every phase of the district's operation that is involved in next year's school budget.

Showing the pressure of student population, Supt. M. C. Deller today reported that the estimated grade school enrollment of 2,917 youngsters this September will be housed in 108 standard elementary classrooms.

In addition, there are two sub-standard rooms, one at Garden Valley and one at Wilbur, which will be used for libraries or activity rooms. Deller said a temporary room at the Riverside school will be pressed into use next year. This is the old cafeteria building. At the same time, one of the rooms at Fullerton will serve for auxiliary purposes such as social music or band.

Deller pointed out that three one-room schools in the district are outmoded, abandoned and out of the picture. They are located at Glenary, Symon Valley and on Callahan Trail.

The number of rooms available at each building and the estimated number of pupils for enrollment in the fall showed:

Benson (12 rooms and 304 pupils), Edendover (2 and 54), Fullerton (23 and 633), Garden Valley (1 and 26), Green (15 and 385), McIntosh (6 and 145), Riverside (2 and 56), Riverside (21 and 602), Rose (18 and 489), Wilbur (5 and 120), and Winchester (4 and 103).

Both the junior highs and Roseburg High School have all rooms in use now.

At that time, most remains and personal effects of the victims were returned to Roseburg. Positive identification followed.

New Leader Plans To Keep War Going

Rebels, Scoring Great Victory, Issue Warning Against Govt. Set-Up

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — The anti-Communist rebel radio said Monday "we do not recognize" the new Guatemalan government of Col. Carlos Enrique Diaz.

It warned insurgent war planes will launch a "general attack" on military targets in Guatemala City if the rebel conditions for peace are not met.

The clandestine insurgent radio heard here said Col. Diaz would have until 6 a.m. (PST) to reply. But the rebel radio was still repeating the warning at 8:20 a.m. The Guatemalan government radio was broadcasting music at 8:20 a.m.

The rebels declared "We fight a system, not a man" and said the same seven conditions "for peace and order" which they broadcast last Saturday still stand.

The rebels Saturday urged the army to form a military junta, arrest Jacobo Arbenz Guzman, then president, and "all other Communists" and join the rebels in forming a new government. Arbenz quit Sunday night and Diaz took over as head of a ruling junta.

Warnings Given

The insurgent warnings Monday said "if their conditions are not met: 'Our air force has its precise instructions for today: '1. A general attack on all military bases in Guatemala City and 2. A concentrated attack on one in particular.' (This target was
