

Japanese Says Bomb Deaths May Be Greater

TOKYO (AP) — A leading Japanese radiologist agreed Thursday that an American doctor's estimate that the Hiroshima and Nagasaki atomic bomb explosions may have killed the officially reported figure of 152,004.

Dr. Masao Tsuzuki said the estimate made Wednesday by Dr. Stafford L. Warren of Los Angeles "can be considered true."

"He should know what he is talking about because he has specialized in this field."

Dr. Warren, dean of the school of medicine and director of the atomic energy project at the University of California at Los Angeles, was among the first Americans to study atomic bomb effects in Japan.

"Accurate figures for the death toll can never be made," Tsuzuki said. "The victims are still dying." The published figures only show what was known from official records which presumed to give the number of persons in Hiroshima and Nagasaki at that time.

"I believe that more than 200,000 have died in the Hiroshima atomic bombing while over 100,000 perished in Nagasaki."

The reported toll was 78,150 at Hiroshima and 72,884 at Nagasaki. However, Hiroshima city officials said 260,000 persons were killed in that city alone.

Glendale Hearing Set On Phone Rate Boost

The Glendale Telephone Co. will hold a public hearing Aug. 10 at the Glendale City Hall on a proposal to raise the service charge on private telephones in the system from \$3 to \$3.20 per month in Glendale and from \$3 to \$3.55 per month in the suburban areas.

The request for the increased service charge is based upon the fact that service for all telephone users will be greatly improved when the new automatic dial system is put into use near the middle of August. The charge is higher for out-of-town subscribers because maintenance and installation expenses are greater in the suburban areas.

The telephone company is asking that as many citizens as possible plan to attend the hearing, whether they are in favor of the proposition or in opposition to it, reports Mrs. G. B. Fox, correspondent.

Nuclear-Driven Planes In Few Years Forecast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Robert LeBaron, a government atomic specialist, predicts that the United States will have an airplane driven by nuclear power within six or seven years.

LeBaron is chairman of the Military Liaison Committee to the Atomic Energy Commission but he devoted most of a copyrighted interview with the Magazine U.S. News and World Report to a discussion of peacetime uses of atomic energy.

He did say, however, that work is proceeding on development of an atomic-powered airplane, on a somewhat longer schedule than the nuclear submarine due for testing this summer.
