In their doubleheader with Sacramento, the usually light-hitting Angels took the first game, 8-4, scoring five runs in the first inning. But they lost the nightcap, 5-1, with Sae hurler Charley Schanz winning his own ball game with a three-run homer in the fifth.

This week, league-leading Hollywood takes on tail-end Portland at Portland. Oakland plays at Seattle, Sacramento at San Francisco and San Diego at Los Angeles.

The Rainiers downed the Stars in a tight second game, 3-2, all their runs coming in the last inning. Artie Wilson's single and a wild throw by Jack Phillips during a run-down did the damage.

Each side got three hits. Seattle won the first game in the last of the fifth, scoring three

Sutherlin Girl Golfer Wins Semifinal, Loses In Final

Carol Jo Kabler lost her bid for the Oregon Golf Assn.'s women's championship Sunday when she fell by a four and three count to Mrs. Mary Frances Rowell of Portland Golf Club in the final at the Rogue Valley Country Club at Medford.

The match went 36 holes with the winner leading all the way

after the 15th hole. Miss Kabler failed to lead at any time during the match but came from behind a one-up deficit to square matters on the ninth hole after losing the first hole.

Mrs. Rowell took a four-up margin on the 14th and was pressuring her way to certain victory when the local contestant won the 17th with a par and birdied the 18th to cut the margin down to two holes.

For the first 18 greens, Mrs. Rowell fired a medal score of 78 and Miss Kabler shot an 80 on the par 76 course.

In the afternoon's play, the two halved the first six holes, but Mrs. Rowell again took a commanding lead by firing a 75-yard chip shot true to the pin for an eagle on the 25th hole.

She went five-up by winning the ninth, 10th and 12th holes, before Carol Jo again trimmed the margin to four-up on the 14th with a birdie. The match ended when the two halved the 15th hole.

Featured by her 75-yard shot, Mrs. Rowell was consistently sharp in both her chipping and putting, and this superiority proved to be the difference Sunday. Carol Jo hit longer, but Mrs. Rowell was straighter to the pin.

For the 36 holes, Mrs. Rowell was three over and Miss Kabler was five over par.
