Five Major League Teams Fight For Top On 'Championship Day'

Five teams are waging a bitter battle for first place by the Fourth of July—the date that tradition has marked as "Championship Day."

Since the turn of the century approximately seven out of every 10 major league leaders on July 4 have gone on to win the pennant. With only a week to go, no team is assured of the top spot on the midseason holiday. The New York Giants lead Brooklyn by the game today but the National League pace-setters face a "crucial" three game series with the Dodgers at the Polo Grounds, starting tomorrow.

Cleveland sports a 1½-game advantage over Chicago in the American League but the White Sox can dislodge the Indians with a sweep of their four-game series in Cleveland next weekend. A letdown by each could pave the way for the New York Yankees to bypass both of them. While the Indians and White Sox are at each other's throats, the Yankees will engage the second-division Washington Senators in a four-game set at Yankee Stadium.

The Indians widened their lead to a game and a half yesterday, salvaging the last of a three-game series from the Yankees 4-3 while Chicago was held to a split by Boston's Red Sox. Beaten 2-1 in the opener, the White Sox bounced back to trounce Boston 9-1 in the second game of their double-header. The loss widened the Yankees' deficit to three games.

New York's sizzling Giants maintained their one-game advantage over the Dodgers with an uphill 3-2 victory over the Chicago Cubs in 10 innings.

The Dodgers equaled a team record by blasting five home runs to polish off the St. Louis Cardinals

8-4 for a sweep of their three-game series.

Granny Hamner was the offensive star as the Philadelphia Phillies swept a twin bill from Milwaukee 4-3 and 2-1. The leading second base candidate for the All Star team banged a three-run homer to give Curt Simmons his seventh victory in the opener.

Frank Thomas' ninth-inning single gave Pittsburgh a 4-3 victory after the Cincinnati Reds had won the opener 9-0 behind Corky Valentine's five-hit pitching. Ted Kluszewski drove in two Redies runs with a double and two singles.

First baseman Dick Kryhoski drove in the winning runs in each game as the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Philadelphia Athletics 4-3 and 3-2 and climbed into sixth place. The double win gave the Orioles five straight following a nine-game losing streak.

SPLITS and HITS

Last week we promised you a rundown on some of the highlights of the A.B.C. Tournament in Seattle. Much of this will be repetition to those of you who read the reports currently during the big show. But there are some items that couldn't be reported such as prizes won until the end of the tournament.

Our association sent nine teams, six booster and three open. One open team placed in the money, and four of the boosters, which is a fine percentage, and above the average. In the open class Harmony house finished 130th in the nation, and seventh in Oregon, with 2,755 pins.

IN THE BOOSTER class, Sun Studs had high total with 2,585, but ended up in fifth spot in their squad. This score would have been high for 16 different squads out of a total of 74, but our boys were just unlucky in getting put into a squad that was hot.

Other booster teams to collect money were Youngs Bay Lumber Co. with 2,522, seventh in their squad; Harris Plumbing 2,419, 14th on the same squad; and Jones Insurance of Myrtle Creek with 2,411, and 16th in the "quad on which they played."

Naturally, in the minor events there was only one class, and that was a hot one. In doubles, Arto and Don Jacklin, one of the few "father-son" combinations in the event, scored a very creditable 1,132 for 475th place, and Bob Shroyer and Jerry Whitten hit 1,111 for 722nd. Jack Shiekman and Bob Smith had 1,073, which was exactly one pin out of the money.

Incidentally, low scores "in the money," were 2,734 in open teams, 2,654 in booster teams, 1,094 in doubles, 588 in singles, and 1,710 in all-events. Joe Coe was the only one to place in A-E with 1,727 and 457th spot.

IN SINGLES, it was Coe, 604, 410th; Earl Wiley 594, 618th; Bob Shroyer 591, 696th; Arto Jacklin 585, 869th; Chuck DeGuire 575, 1,190th; Bill Winston 574, 1,218th, and Spike Warren 559, for 1,867th. Spike got in by one pin.

One of our local boys found out what it costs to "speed" in Washington state. He set he was only making about 35, but it happened in a 20-mile zone (\$15 worth of education). Another lad figured Seattle would be kind to guests from Oregon, so parked in a spot that set, "No parking at any time." Hollywood Man Named 'Mr. America' Of '54

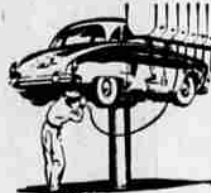
LOS ANGELES (U) — "Mr. America" of 1954 is 215-pound blond Richard DuBois, 21, of Hollywood.
