Pastors' Cooling Effort Heats Up Residents

CUSHING, Okla. (AP)—Pastors' efforts to keep cool have this northeast Oklahoma City's 8,000 residents hot and bothered.

It all began when several ministers requested and received permission from the city to observe a twice-weekly "Preachers' Hour" at the Cushing Memorial Swimming Pool.

The city council ruled June 15 that men of cloth may swim, free of charge and the gaze of laymen from 7 to 8 a. m. Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The Rev. Carroll Fairbanks, pastor of the First Christian Church, said emphatically he opposed the plan.

"When I swim, it will be with my fellow men—that means the general public," he declared. And letters have been bombarded the editor of the local newspaper.

WOULD TAKE AWAY CONTROL

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Interior Committee Friday recommended enactment of legislation that would lead to removal of federal control over the Klamath Indians of Oregon.

The measure would authorize the Indians to decide for themselves how they will divide their jointly held cash and land.

Other bills concerning small tribes in Washington and in other states still are pending.

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
