

Morse Hurls Smear Charge In Tilt Over Coosa Dam Bill

WASHINGTON — Sen. Wayne Morse chastized a fellow senator and a newspaper reporter last Friday on the Senate floor for what he charged was a misrepresentation of his position on a "partnership" dam bill the Senate passed two weeks ago.

Morse said he opposed legislation giving Alabama Power Co. authority to build five dams on the Coosa River where Congress in 1945 authorized federally-financed projects which have never been built. The senator said he voted against the Coosa bill when it came before the Public Works

Committee, of which he is a member. He said he failed to declare his opposition on the floor of the Senate because the day the bill came up he was called away because of illness of Mrs. Morse.

Morse said Sen. Prescott Bush (R-Conn.) had inaccurately reported his stand on the bill during its debate by the Senate. Bush was asked by Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore) whether the bill had been approved unanimously by the Public Works Committee, obviously an effort to learn how Morse had voted. Bush gave an equivocal answer that left the impression no one had voted against the bill "in the last analysis."

Adlai Would Reverse 'Mess' Charge At GOP

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — The Democrats should adopt the 1952 Republican campaign slogan — "That there is a mess in Washington," says Adlai E. Stevenson.

The Republican national administration, Stevenson said Monday night is "so hopelessly torn and divided within itself that it cannot govern."

"Never have so many been promised so much and wait so long for so little," the 1952 Democratic presidential nominee said.

Stevenson told 600 persons at a \$20 a plate party dinner that the Republicans pledged everything from balancing the budget to the "greatest leadership since Washington."

The state of the nation's affairs has become, he added, "far too perilous for us as Democrats to derive partisan satisfaction from it."

"Failure of the present administration," he said, "can only mean failure for us all; if it fails we and our friends, and those coming after us, too, will pay a fearful price."

Glendale's Phone System To Be Modernized To Meet Urgent Needs For Expansion

The new switchboard for the Glendale Telephone system has been shipped and part of the equipment has arrived. According to Mrs. Vera Kemp, office manager of the company, Aug. 18 has been tentatively set as the date for changing the system over to the new, modern and much larger capacity switchboard.

During the month following that date it is hoped that approximately 100 of those who have been on the waiting list for service will have telephones installed.

During the past year, Robert Jones, owner and manager of the company, has been doing extensive modernization and repair on the system which at present includes approximately 300 telephones in the three-community area of Glendale, Azalea and Wolf Creek.

A new switchboard was installed at Azalea, and old, no-longer serviceable lines were replaced up Cow Creek, beyond Azalea.

Other new lines were put in, and old-fashioned telephones were replaced by modern dial-type phones. The modernization program in the Azalea area had just been completed when the snow storm in January of this year struck, knocking out communication lines up and down the coast. The Glendale system was worse damaged than most, for new poles had not had time to settle. Nearly

every new pole fell, and newly strung wires were twisted and broken. It required more than a month for Jones and an expanded crew to get the entire telephone system back into working order, and modernization of the Glendale end of the system was slowed down accordingly.

Additional Line Planned

As a preventative against future storm damage Jones is installing neoprene cable within the city and its suburbs and out toward Wolf Creek.

In order to improve service another main line will be put in between Glendale and Azalea. The number of subscribers on any one line will be reduced in Glendale, proper, after the new switchboard is cut in, there will be no more than four to a line. At present there are as many as 10 to a line with residential and business phones, in some cases, mixed. All wall-type phones will be exchanged for modern, desk-type dial phones. There will be no toll-free for calls going from one part of the system to any other part of the Glendale-Azalea, and Wolf Creek hook-up, unless calls are made from pay phones.

According to Mrs. Kemp, after the automatic switchboard has been activated, all local calls will go through Roseburg operators. There will be a business representative in the office, but the switchboard will require no attendant.

Persons wishing to put their names on the waiting list for a telephone may sign application cards at the telephone office.

According to Mrs. Kemp, the Glendale telephone system is one of approximately 500 independent telephone associations which serve some nine million of the 50 million telephone users in the United States.
