Complaint

Stomar Lumber Co. vs. Piper Lumber Co. Plaintiff company charges that defendant "wrongfully disposed of 440,640 board feet of timber allegedly belonging to plaintiff. Demands \$17,625.60.

Notice of Appeal

Cecilia A. Wicklund and Premier Insurance Co. vs. Clarence A. Horton. Plaintiffs charge defendant owes \$50 to Wicklund and \$321.75 to Premier as the result of damages done to the Wicklund car in an accident Nov. 18, 1953. Charged that defendant's car tried to pass on the left side as the plaintiff's car, driven by Don Poulson, a son, was about to make a left turn off Highway 99 eight miles south of Roseburg. District court ruled in favor of plaintiff in trial May 24. City of Yoncalla vs. George Bartholmy. Was found guilty Friday of assault and fined \$50 by Municipal Judge Stacy Adams. Served notice of appeal to circuit court. Bail continued at \$100.

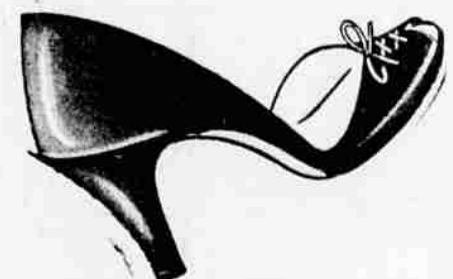
