Mustering-Out Pay Deadline Told To Vets
SALEM — Korean veterans discharged before July 17, 1952 and who have never applied for mustering-out pay have only until July 16 to do so, the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs said Monday.

Veterans through the rank of Army Captain or equivalent may receive \$300 for more than 60 days service including overseas, \$200 over 60 days in stateside service, and \$100 for less than 60 days.

Public Payroll Getting Larger, Statistics Show

WASHINGTON — This is discouraging news for taxpayers, but the public payroll is getting larger, not smaller.

Federal civilian employment has been on a gradual decline since President Eisenhower took office in January 1953.

However, states and local governing bodies have been adding employees faster than the federal government cut them off.

A Census Bureau report Tuesday showed not only that there were more people on the public payrolls in April than ever before in that month, but also that their salaries added to the largest April total in history.

Over the weekend Chairman Rees (R-Kan.) of the House Civil Service Committee said he was encouraged that the Eisenhower administration had eliminated 218,243 jobs up to June 1 at an annual payroll savings of \$51 million dollars.

The census report, however, showed that in April public employment of all kind—federal, state and local—numbered 7,983,000. This compares with 7,061,000 in April 1953, 6,925,000 in 1952, 5,360,000 in 1950, and 6,754,000 in 1945, the final year of World War II.

The over-all public employment payroll cost for April was \$2,033,700,000. This compares with \$1,696,900,000 in April 1953, \$1,879,300,000 in 1952, \$1,422,100,000 in 1950, and \$1,389,000,000 in April 1954.

Employment of more school teachers has been the most important factor in increasing the employment on the non-federal level.

Crowley Quits Reds, Testifies Against Them
WASHINGTON — Francis X. P. Crowley, one of nine persons cited for contempt for refusing to testify about Communist Party connections, Monday reversed his stand and testified freely before the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Crowley, a 28-year-old New Yorker and one-time University of Michigan student, appeared voluntarily and told about his Red activity in New York, Boston and Ann Arbor, Mich.

He said a Catholic priest advised him to "tell the full story." And he said his "conscience" dictated his change of attitude, rather than the decision of the House May 11 to send his case to the Justice Department for prosecution.

"I no longer believe in it," said Crowley of communism.

"I see no reason for me to be a scapegoat for something I don't believe in."

A year ago Crowley refused to tell the committee about his 1946 membership in the Red Connolly Club in New York or a 1947 connection with the West End Club of Boston.

Monday he testified that he electioneered for Communist-endorsed candidates in those cities. And later, he added, he went to Ann Arbor to resume his studies and immediately became a member of the Ralph Neufus Club on the Michigan campus.

The witness said the club was made up mainly of Communist students.

Bill May Outlaw Foreign Bids On Dam Equipment

WASHINGTON — Government purchase of foreign-made generators and other electrical equipment for federal power projects would be forbidden under a bill introduced Monday by Rep. Shelley (D-Calif.).

Urging speedy action on the measure, Shelley told the House foreign firms last year were awarded contracts with a dollar value he said amounted to almost 65 per cent of those given American firms.

Bidding for hydraulic governors for the power plant at The Dalles Dam in Oregon was cited by the congressman.

Shelley said the Pelton Water Wheel Co. of San Francisco spent \$25,000 retooling and preparing its bid but was undercut 22.4 per cent by a Japanese firm.

The Japanese bid did not meet all specifications, he said, and the contract should have been awarded to the San Francisco firm but all bids were thrown out and re-advertising ordered because of State Department pressures.

As a result, the congressman declared, the Pelton firm has little chance of winning the contract because "foreign bidders now have the advantage of knowing how low they must bid to get outside the 25 per cent Buy American differential."

Tax Bill Debate Opens In Senate; Okay Predicted

WASHINGTON — Sen. Millikin (R-Colo.), opening Senate debate on the administration's omnibus tax revision bill, said Monday failure to enact it "will sorely disappoint millions of taxpayers."

Millikin, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and floor manager for the bill, stressed the benefits in the measure for many groups of taxpayers in urging the Senate to pass it promptly.

The measure would not change major levies, but would cut taxes an estimated \$1,400,000,000 a year by correcting what Millikin called "hardships and inequities."

Among those who would benefit, he said, would be working mothers, retired persons especially including school teachers and policemen, fathers sending children to college, and farmers who follow good soil conservation practices.

Approval Predicted
Millikin also sought to anticipate arguments of Democrats who want to add an income tax cut to the bill.

"Because of budget limitations, the bill does not go as far as many would like," he conceded.

However, he added that rates can be lowered and personal exemptions raised "when the budget situation improves."

In advance of the debate, both Millikin and Senate GOP Leader Knowland of California predicted the measure would go through the Senate in substantial form it was asked by the President.

Lending strength to their prediction was a three-way split among Senate Democrats over what changes they should seek to include.
