Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Bentley and their teen-age son will take over the duties of the Christian Church pastorate.

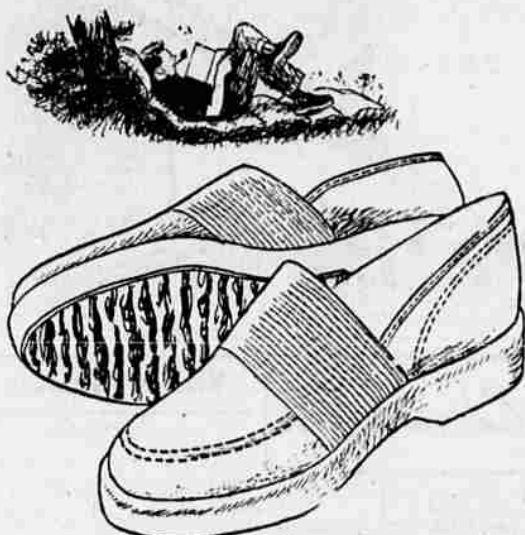
Bible School Ends
