Foreign Languages 'Must' For Air Force

WIESBADEN, Germany (AP) — Most U.S. Air Force officers and enlisted personnel in Germany, France, Italy and North Africa will have to start compulsory foreign language courses next month. Air Force headquarters here said they would be required to take a 30-hour course in the language of the country in which they are stationed. The instruction was ordered by Lt. Gen. William H. Tunner, commander of the U.S. Air Force in Europe, who said the language courses were ordered to "break down the barriers between people."

Britain Will Withdraw Troops From Suez Zone

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Times said the United States and Britain have agreed on a method for total withdrawal of the 80,000 British troops in the Suez Canal zone.

In a dispatch from Washington, the Times quoted "high diplomatic sources" as saying "that Sir Winston Churchill and President Eisenhower were prepared to back a proposal for complete British evacuation from the zone over a two-year period."

Egypt would agree, the newspaper reported, "to make the canal zone available to Allied forces in the event of a Soviet attack on any Middle Eastern state."

Rotary International Reviving In Europe

MARBURG, Germany (AP) — Rotary International, which the Soviet Union forbids in the Communist bloc, is growing fast along the Iron Curtain. West Germany's 66th Rotary Club has just received its charter in Marburg. This American-conceived movement for friendship among nations was introduced in Germany in 1927. Adolf Hitler banned it and dissolved 40 clubs in 1934 after he had assumed dictatorial power. When the West German Republic was set up in 1949, Rotary came back. Total German membership now exceeds 2,200. Five or six new clubs are being chartered in this country yearly.
