

## Glendale School Vote Results Approve Lights, Bleacher Fund

Citizens of District 77, Glendale and Azalea, elected three new school board members and voted to spend a \$27,000 special fund for lights and bleachers for the high school athletic field at the school election held at the high school library June 21. Ballots cast totaled 239.

### Board Members Named

For the three-year term on the school board, Louis Brady of Azalea was unopposed except for a scattering of write-in votes. He polled 226 votes. Loeta Fisher of Glendale was elected to a four-year term. She received 111 votes as compared to 83 for Glen Kafer and 44 for Bert Day. Voting was close on the choice for a 3-year board member. Albert Vaughn won with 126 votes, and George Mill was close behind with 101. One hundred sixty one citizens voted yes on the proposition of spending a \$27,000 fund for lights and bleachers on the high school athletic field. Seventy six voted no.

Election clerks were Mrs. Clara O. Ross, Miss Alice Niebel, Mrs. Marie Young, and Mrs. Ruth Setner.

## Archaeologists Identify Ruined Step Pyramid

SAQQARA, Egypt — Top Egyptian archaeologists said Tuesday the ruined step pyramid recently discovered in this burial ground of early Egyptian pharaohs was that of Sekhem-Khet, a ruler of the ancient third dynasty.

The alabaster sarcophagus in the pyramid's main burial chamber was opened Sunday but was found to be empty.

The announcement of the pharaoh's name was made by Zakaria Goniwe, the discoverer of the pyramid. Speaking to the Egyptian Premier Gamel Abdel Nasser and a group of newsmen touring the area, Goniwe said the ruler's name appeared on the covers of several jars found in the pyramid's chambers.

Mustafa Amer, Egypt's director general of antiquities, said Sekhem-Khet was a member of the third dynasty which reigned over the Nile territory around 2750 B.C.

## Truman's Condition Reported Improved

KANSAS CITY — Harry S. Truman's condition was reported as "better" last night although he was described as somewhat tired after a restless day.

The former President's recovery from an emergency operation June 20 as been hampered by an intestinal inflammation. His recovery appeared highly satisfactory for a few days after his gall bladder and appendix were removed in the operation. Then he was harassed by secondary infections and a hypersensitivity to drugs.

## Nation-Wide Water Study Completed With Finish Of Hearings In Portland

PORTLAND — A Hoover Commission task force completed a nation-wide survey of water and power resources with a two-day session which ended here Tuesday.

The 47 speakers who appeared at the Portland session offered varied views on how the region's water resources could best be developed.

Among proposals advanced Tuesday was a public corporation, financing its operations through bond issues, to replace the Bonneville Power Administration. This was the suggestion of Gus Norwood, executive secretary of the Northwest Public Power Assn., which represents 130 publicly owned electric systems.

He would have Congress authorize specific projects recommended

by the corporation, then the corporation would undertake construction with financing bonds guaranteed by the federal government.

Most of Tuesday's witnesses were advocates of public power and were closely cross-examined by the 18-member task force which is headed by Ben Moreell, head of the Jones and Laughlin Steel Corp. of Pittsburgh.

Thomas L. Scanlon, director of research and education for the Oregon AFL State Federation of Labor, said his union favored federal development of the region's rivers and opposed the partnership development program.

Moreell asked Scanlon if he also favored government operation of such industries as building and of

food production. When Scanlon said he did not, Moreell asked: "In other words, you are interested only in government intrusion in the power field?"

Gov. J. Bracken Lee of Utah, an ardent supporter of private enter-

prise, asked Scanlon if he favored removal of taxes from private utilities. Scanlon replied in the negative and Lee then asked: "In other words, to get the low power cost here, you are taking advantage of the people of the rest of the country?"

## Oregonians Charged With Automobile Theft

INDIANAPOLIS — Jerry Lee Grow, 21, and Mrs. Jeanne Carol Owen, 24, both of Tillamook, Ore., were charged here Tuesday with automobile theft.

Police said they were arrested as they tried to sell a radio taken from a car stolen earlier in Helena, Mont.

Police said Mrs. Owen told them

she left her husband and two children at Tillamook and with Grow stole a car from Independence, Ore., June 22. That car was abandoned at Helena where another car, owned Kenneth Hartzog, Sunnyvale, Calif., was taken.

The two are being held here while the FBI investigates further.

Other speakers presented these views: John T. Gharrett of the Pacific Marine Fisheries Commission urged that planning of northwest water resources should include consideration of the problems of fisheries.

W. R. Armstrong, president of the Idaho Rural Electric Cooperative, urged publicly owned power.

O. H. Johnson, Seattle Chamber of Commerce, spoke in favor of the partnership program in resources development while J. Kenard Cheadle, Spokane Chamber of Commerce, advocated "federal participation without federal domination."

E. R. Buehler, of the Idaho

Assn. of Soil Conservation Districts, urged federal coordination of conservation practices with local directors of all agriculture affairs.

J. Frank Ward, managing director of the Washington State Power Commission, urged that local agencies be permitted to build projects authorized for federal construction, if financed properly.

Stuart Muir, Western Forestry and Conservation Assn., opposed federal land ownership.

Herbert G. West of the Inland Empire Waterways Assn. commended the Corps of Engineers for its development program and criticized Congress and the Bureau of the Budget for "not making recommendations for continuing planning funds."
