CIO Urges Additional Social Security Coverage

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Congress of Industrial Organizations (CIO) urged the Senate Wednesday to go further than the House in expanding social security coverage.

Joseph Childs, speaking for the CIO, asked the Senate Finance Committee in prepared testimony to boost the ceiling on earnings taxes to \$6,000 a year, instead of the \$4,200 voted by the House and the present \$3,600. The current tax rate, levied on both workers and employers, is 2 per cent.

Childs, a vice president of the CIO United Rubber Workers, also urged:

1. Inclusion of physicians and migrant farm workers in the social security system.

2. Enactment of a long-term disability insurance program so that pension rights of disabled workers are not frozen until they reach the present minimum age of 65.
